Jefferson—Mrs. H. C. Epley fell Thursday, cracking the bone in her arm and wrist.

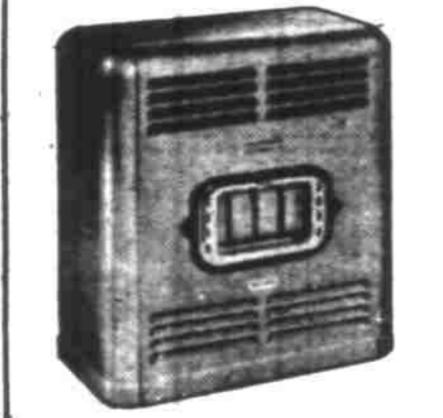
