













Stock Market Ignores Strike; **Scores Gains**

NEW YORK, March 30-(AP)-The stock market today took the Wall Street strike in stride and enjoyed one of its best recoveries of the past two weeks.

While heavy picket lines surrounded the exchange, and there was a forenoon outburst of violence, brokerage and floor operations again were reported "more or less normal."

Prices began to stiffen and activity quickened around midday. From then on the move was upward with amusements, steels, rails, oils and assorted industrials exhibiting strength. Gains ran to 2 points or so at the close with a few wider climbers in evidence. Volume was 1,060,000 shares compared with 760,000 Monday.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 6 of a point at 64.4, a peak since last January 16. Of 986 issues registering, 588 rose and 202 fell.

Grain Market Trends Varied

CHICAGO, March 30-(AP)-Grain futures made little progress of their direction at the board of 60.5 trade today. Opening generally 63.3 lower, wheat led other grains in influenced largefutures made little progress in einervous trading, influenced largely by reports of government purchases of cash grain.
