Life Termer Escapée Caught By City Police

Ollie Cecil Wiles, 35, Sedro Woolley, Wash., ex-convict and escapee under two life sentences in Washington state, will appear in district court in Salem today to enter his plea on a burglary charge.

Wiles was arrested by city police at 12:40 a.m. Wednesday in the F. W. Woolworth store, Liberty and State streets, where police said he was attempting burglary. Thad I. Mundell, 1080 1/2 N. Church st., summoned police after hearing a noise in the second floor of the store. Wiles first told police he was Dewey Donald Brown.

Police said they arrested Wiles in a hallway near the store manager's office. Wiles had gained entry by lifting out a skylight and lowering himself into the ladies' dressing room with a clothesline rope, police stated.

Wiles, in a statement, told police he had jumped from the room in an adjacent hotel onto the roof of the Woolworth building, a leap of about four feet across a narrow alley. He said he waited an hour after removing the skylight to determine whether police had been summoned, then entered the building.

Police said Wiles escaped from the Skagit county jail in Mt. Vernon, Wash., March 13, 1948, while on a two-year term for habitual criminal charges.

Wiles' long criminal career, police stated, began in 1934 when he was arrested for burglary and served a year in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla, Wash. He was convicted for burglary again in 1936, was paroled after serving three years and four months, and received an additional eight months in the penitentiary for parole violation a short time later.

In 1941, police said, he was held at Bremerton, Wash., for investigation and in 1947 was arrested three times on misdemeanor charges.

On Forgery Charges
On December 12, 1947, Wiles was arrested in Skagit county on two forgery charges, police said. He was found guilty on both charges and sentenced on March 4, 1948, to two concurrent life sentences on habitual criminal charges—being convicted of more than three felonies.

After escaping from jail March 13, Wiles said he went to nearby Burlington, Wash., where he had planted \$65 in cash, food for two weeks and a change of clothing. He said he spent 13 days in the woods near Burlington, sleeping in a hollow log during the nights. After hiding out he said he hitch hiked to Seattle and then to Portland. In Portland he said he was given a job by a logging firm and was instructed to go to Salem where he was to be given transportation to Valselt Wednesday.

Wiles appeared in district court Wednesday for preliminary examination and his bail was set at \$2,500. He is being held in the county jail.

Wheat, Corn Show Weak on Board of Trade

CHICAGO, March 31 —(AP)—Wheat and corn put on a weak display at the board of trade today. Prices opened lower, never got above the previous close and ended only fractions over the day's extreme lows.

In contrast to the two major grains, oats held steady. Rains in the central states were expected to cause further delays in planting. Soybeans scored substantial advances in a tight trade, aided by strength in cottonseed oil. Lard sank with another drop in hog prices.

Wheat closed 2 1/4 to 3 cents lower, May \$2.41 1/4, corn was 1 to 2 1/2 lower, May \$2.15 1/4 to 2.16, oats were 1/4 lower to 2 1/2 higher, May \$1.09 1/4 to 1.10, and soybeans were 4 to 6 cents higher, May \$3.67.

Initial selling in wheat was based on disappointment over the amount of flour purchased on the previous day by the production and marketing administration. The government agency had offered equal to 10,460,000 bushels of wheat, but took only 1,200,000 bushels. Prices of other offers were said to be "too high."

A temporary rally followed announcement by the Commodity Credit Corporation that it had bought 1,945,000 bushels of wheat at Kansas City yesterday, a large amount for one day.

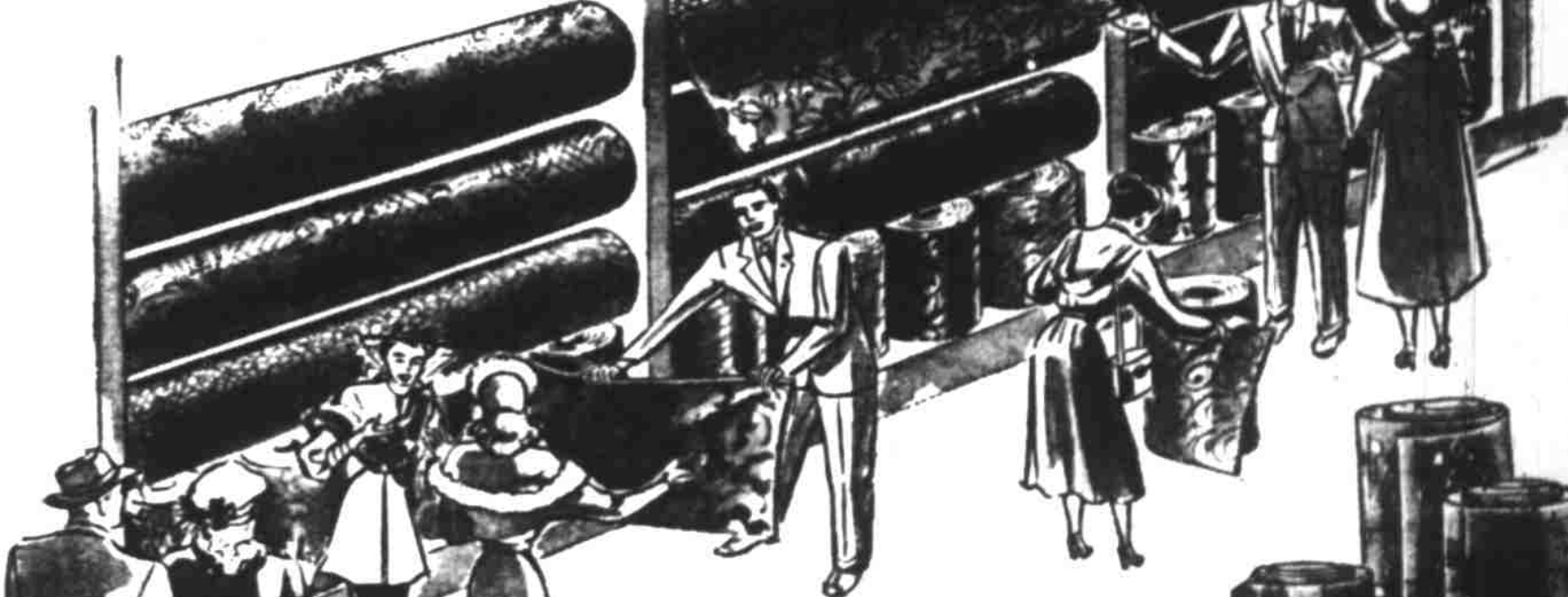

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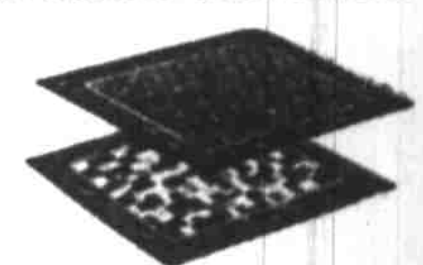
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
