

Dewey Leads Tabulation of GOP Delegates

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Voters elected 117 republican delegates to the national convention in Wisconsin and New York today to bring the total to 303 of the 1,094 to be chosen.

As well as the division could be made, here was the box score so far (counting the latest returns from Wisconsin as final):

Vandenberg's 41 are from his home state of Michigan. They are unassigned, but have endorsed the senator if he is available.

Stassen's 49 comprise the 25 from his home state of Minnesota, two from New Hampshire and 22 from Wisconsin.

Dewey's 107 were made up of 10 from Oklahoma, six from New Hampshire, one from Wisconsin and 90 from New York.

MacArthur's four are from Wisconsin.

Sawmill Union Elects Russell

SILVERTON, April 6 (Special)—O. E. Russell, crane operator, was elected Tuesday night as president of local 225, Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (AFL).

Other officers chosen were James Skapsky, power plant engineer, as secretary succeeding George Christenson, and Herbert Kness, trustee for three years replacing John Wallace.

The 50 members of the local voted to meet first and third Tuesdays at the Knights of Pythias hall.

Howard Hayes, Eugene, president of the Willamette valley district council, was present to help in negotiating a new contract for the union with the Silvertown division, Oregon Pulp and Paper Co., successors to Silver Falls Timber Co.

Morse Urges Highway Aid

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore) proposed today amending the federal aid highway act so as to provide \$500,000,000 a year for three years for extension and improvement of federal aid highways.

The funds would be made available for the fiscal years ending June 30 in 1950, 1951 and 1952.

Morse's amendment would allocate 45 per cent of the funds to the federal aid highway system, 30 per cent to secondary roads including county and township roads and 25 per cent to federal projects in urban areas. It would provide \$25,000,000 each year for forest highways, \$12,500,000 for forest development roads and trails, \$4,500,000 for construction and maintenance of roads and trails in national parks, \$10,000,000 for parkways to national parks and \$6,000,000 for roads in Indian reservations.

FDR's Family Opposes Name Of New Party

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6 (AP)—Members of the Roosevelt family today were opposed to use of the late president's name by a group of Oregon democrats.

Letters from Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, her son, James of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Boettiger, Phoenix, Ariz., were published by the Oregonian. They deplored use of the Roosevelt name by a committee which has slated candidates in the May 21 democratic primary.

The Portland chapter, Americans for Democratic Action, which released Mrs. Roosevelt's letter, said it was aimed at the Roosevelt candidates are members of the Progressive Citizens of America, a pro-Wallace group.

In her letter, the late president's widow said: "I have consistently opposed the third party under Mr. Wallace because I am convinced that he had with him elements which are dangerous to this country." She added "Any use of my husband's name in connection with that party is, in my opinion, entirely dishonest."

Later today Clifford T. Howlett, democratic state secretary and a member of the Roosevelt Democratic committee, said the ADA statement labeling the group as "third parties" is a "gross misstatement." He said he was not bolting the party and not a member of the ADA or the PCA.

Speakers Laud Army Might On Army Day

The nation mingled pride with preparedness Tuesday in celebrating Army day.

Pride in the army's accomplishments; preparedness for the unguessed hazards of next month or next year.

Down Washington's flag-decked Constitution avenue thousands of men and women of the armed forces swung stumps on foot or rolled in big troop carriers past President Truman's reviewing stand.

The Marine Corps band, in scarlet coats, blared out "Dixie" to the yells of thousands massed along the sidewalks.

Waves and Waves joined in the march.

Overhead, a formation of deadly jet fighters ripped from the capitol to the White House in a matter of seconds.

Four or five Russian military observers in full uniform sat in a back row of a grandstand, far to the right of President Truman's reviewing stand in the shadow of the Washington monument.

Secretary for Air Symington told an audience at Raleigh, N. C., they must gather our strength and place it in plain view of men who recognize and respect no other argument. Without mentioning Russia by name, Symington declared that a force bent on destroying individual and national freedom is "aggressively on the move."

At Rhode Island Lt. Gen. W. S. Paul, army personnel director, told a Providence, R. I., gathering that "national security in 1948 is the business of every person living in this nation." He described the army's most urgent need as trained manpower and a system of training manpower for the future.

Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, director of plans and operations for the general staff, declared in Los Angeles that "by generating additional military power in the United States and in countries friendly to us, we may avoid another world war."

Secretary of the Army Royall told an Army day dinner in Washington that "the four essentials of a realistic peace are fairness, firmness, firepower and faith."

Laborites to Tax Investors

LONDON, April 6 (AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps laid a special tax upon wealthy British investors today as a measure against inflationary spending.

Conservations at once declared it was a "camouflaged capital levy."

The chancellor of the exchequer said the tax, ranging from 10 to 50 per cent on unearned incomes from interest, dividends and rents in the upper brackets, in addition to income tax, undoubtedly will have to be paid "largely out of capital."

Cripps said the special levy would be assessed for one year only and would raise a "contribution" of about 105,000,000 pounds (\$420,000,000).

With the levy, Cripps excused half a million little men from income taxes and eased the bite on millions of other low bracket income taxpayers.

Silverton Man Hurt in Wreck

Pete Sorenson, sr., of Silverton, amusement operator, was in "critical" condition at Salem General hospital early today following a mishap on the Chemawa-Silverton road, two miles east of the totem pole.

Other occupants were not seriously hurt when the pickup truck rolled over about 4 p. m. Tuesday. How the accident occurred was not known, though police believed only the one car was involved.

Sorenson suffered a fractured right shoulder, possible fractured ribs, head injuries and shock, according to his physician.

Sorenson and Ed Janz of Silverton, who suffered a cut left hand, were first treated by Salem first aid attendants. A third occupant was reported by them to be unhurt.

Salem First Aid Car Also Rates Visitors

Admiration and curiosity rather than cuts or pains brought a large number of Freedom Train visitors to Salem's first aid car Tuesday. Members of the crew said only a few skinned knees and bruises came to their attention.

But they were called on for many explanations about the new aid car, acquired early this year. It was ready for action all day near the train's entrance.

North Salem Group Meets

Further organization procedures were accomplished and project plans discussed Tuesday night by members of the newly formed North Salem Business association in a meeting at the Willamette Valley bank.

President Wallace Bonesteel conducted the session, at which articles of incorporation, by-laws and a system of membership dues were approved. Regular meetings were set for the second Tuesday of each month, with board meetings to be on president's call.

A proposed list of standing committees was outlined during a discussion of possible association projects, including community betterment and legislation.

Negro Adult School Planned

PORTLAND, April 6 (AP)—Establishment of a school at which adult negroes may study elementary subjects in connection with Bible study is planned here.

The Rev. Shepherd K. Holland, executive secretary of the clergyman Christian educational program, said a drive was being started to raise \$5000 as initial payment on a site for the school.

The project is aimed, he said, at negroes who came to Portland from the deep south and were deficient in schooling in such subjects as elementary arithmetic, reading and speech. Also to be stressed, he said, were courtesies and conduct.

Mr. Holland said classes had been conducted in several rented locations for the past two years, but the aim now is to establish a permanent institution.

Huge Hailstones Damage Buildings

EMINENCE, Ky., April 6 (AP)—Hailstones which some observers said were "big as baseballs" pelted the Henry county village of nearby Turners Station this afternoon as similar storms of lesser intensity struck a large area of Kentucky.

The hailstones reportedly measured from four to six inches in diameter and damaged virtually every building in Turners Station. The hail was accompanied by heavy rain and continued for 45 minutes.

No personal injuries were reported.

Position of Rescue Party Unknown

VERLOT RANGER STATION, Mt. Baker National Forest, April 6 (AP)—A radio blackout tonight continued to mask the progress of a ground party trying to reach the wreckage of a crashed air force reserve plane on snow-covered Pilchuck peak.

The plane, with three aboard, crashed on the peak last Friday. This ranger station reported tonight at 8 p. m. that it had not been able to communicate with the ground party since early this afternoon.

Second Helicopter Takes to Oregon Air

PORTLAND, April 6 (AP)—The Journal's second helicopter was in operation today.

It is a replacement for the craft which crashed last December, killing C. S. Jackson, associate publisher, and Ambrose M. Cronin, jr., Portland businessman.

Conscientious Cabbie Kills Self After Wreck

BUENOS AIRES, April 6 (AP)—A taxi driver killed himself today after an accident in which his five passengers were slightly hurt. The taxi turned over at high speed, but the driver was unhurt.

The driver saw the passengers lying inside the car. He walked away a few steps and shot himself through the head.

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British-Soviet Chiefs Talk at Berlin Dinner

BERLIN, April 6 (AP)—Speculation grew in this tension torn capital tonight that Great Britain had made an effort to smooth differences with Russia over Germany at a secret banquet between Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery and Marshal Vasily Sokolovsky.

Montgomery met the soviet commander at a dinner party given by the British commander in Germany, Gen. Sir Brian Robertson. The party was closely guarded by military police and a non-committal communique followed it.

Montgomery, chief of the British imperial general staff, is scheduled to leave for Britain tomorrow morning and it was expected he would report to the British government his findings in Germany, including the results of his conversations with Sokolovsky.

It was considered certain that the British and soviet leaders discussed Russian restrictions on rail traffic by the western allies, as well as the tragic crash of a soviet fighter plane into a British transport. Fifteen persons were killed in the crash.

Jews Raid British Camp, Steal Arms

JERUSALEM, April 6 (AP)—Jews raided the biggest British military camp in northern Palestine today, killed the commanding officer and six other soldiers, and escaped with a large amount of guns and ammunition, a military statement said.

The Jews wore the blue uniforms of the Palestine police and military dress, the British said. Jewish sources here said the attackers were members of Irgun Zvai Leumi, an underground group. Six British soldiers were wounded.

Freedom Train Traffic Adds to Tie-up at Bridge

A citywide and areawide trek to the Freedom Train while it was at the state fairgrounds Tuesday added complications to Salem traffic problems. At 5:30 p. m. a rush hour on any day, westbound traffic headed for the Salem-West Salem bridge on Center street had "backed up" as far as Cottage street in a line broken only by the street intersections intervening.

Circus Stands Drop; 46 Hurt

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., April 6 (AP)—Forty-six persons, including 20 children, were injured today when a reserved seat section in the main tent of the Bailey Brothers circus collapsed near the end of the matinee performance.

There were no critical injuries. The seat section, witnesses said, appeared to give way at one end and fell down almost without warning. Most of the injuries were caused when their feet and legs were caught under seats. The section normally accommodates 800 persons.

There was much commotion, but no panic. The collapse came during the final elephant act. The animals were led without incident from under the big top.

U.S. Challenges Czechoslovaks To State Case

LAKE SUCCESS, April 6 (AP)—An unexpected American challenge to the communist-dominated Czechoslovak government to state its case was approved today by the security council.

The council voted 9 to 0 to extend a formal invitation to the Czechoslovak government to put forward a representative who would take part in the United Nations debate on the February communist coup in Czechoslovakia. It adjourned the case until Monday to hear Prague's reply.

Andrej A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy minister, and Vasily A. Tarasenko, Soviet Ukraine, abstained from voting. They have bitterly opposed hearing Chile's charges that Russia helped the communists gain power and interfered in Czechoslovakia's internal affairs.

The council voted after Warren R. Austin, chief United States delegate, expressed wonder that Czechoslovakia has been reluctant

to appear before the council and asked: "Can it be that the Czechoslovak government is afraid of participating in an open debate?"
