Council to Hear Local Appeal For Migrants

The problem of farm labor supply in the Salem area, which brought a request from the Salem employment service office last week for several hundred hop workers, will be discussed at a meeting in Portland Friday of the farm advisory council of the state employment service.

D. F. Kennedy of Independence, representing hop growers, and Ammon Grice, Salem route 4, Farmers Union representative, will attend the meeting as council members from this area.

With Mexicans and other nationals already in early California and Texas agricultural fields, the question of migratory labor used during Oregon's seasonal harvest peaks this June and September will be discussed. Truman Chase of Eugene, chairman of the 10-man council, said here Tuesday.

Location of migrant information housing for in-migrants and farm safety measures also will be talked over. Farm labor employment in Oregon will be under the direction of the state employment service this year.

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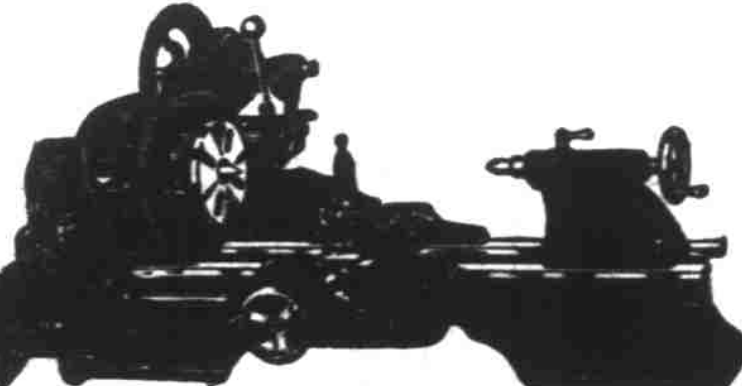
