Take It Easy

Rural Women May Show City Sisters How to Use Leisure

Rural women may now show city housewives a few pointers on how to use their "leisure." This is the impression one would gain by considering what the 29 Marion county home economics units have been doing during their year's activities.

Seven projects tackled by the units this winter have been completed, and results were shown at the homemakers festival at Veterans of Foreign Wars hall on Tuesday. Eleanor Trindle, Marion county home demonstration agent, assisted by Mrs. Constance Hampton and further aided by unit leaders, completed these projects: uses for pressure sauce pans; new materials; one-dish menus; salads and salad dressings; making footstools; care of skin; good taste in clothing.

Then to finish off the year, a workshop on refinishing furniture was conducted early in March at Macleay Grange hall by Mrs. Myrtle Carter, extension specialist from Oregon State college.

Of all the projects, two stood out as unusually practical—making footstools and refinishing furniture.

Nine pieces of refinished furniture were shown at the festival, Tuesday, which by the way attracted over 500 women. Mrs. Roland Seeger, Liberty, and Mrs. Drew Michaels, Edina lane, after refinishing their chairs made need-to-point for them, to complete the re-furbishing job.

Mrs. Beulah Maus of Lansing Neighbors Unit refinished a piano bench and now is ambitious to remove the old finish from her piano and re-do that.

The second most interesting thing accomplished during the year was the footstool project. Wooden frames were made for the women who entered into the project. They were then upholstered according to the best methods. Tying springs, applying webbing, muslin tops and finally coverings gave the women a good lesson in

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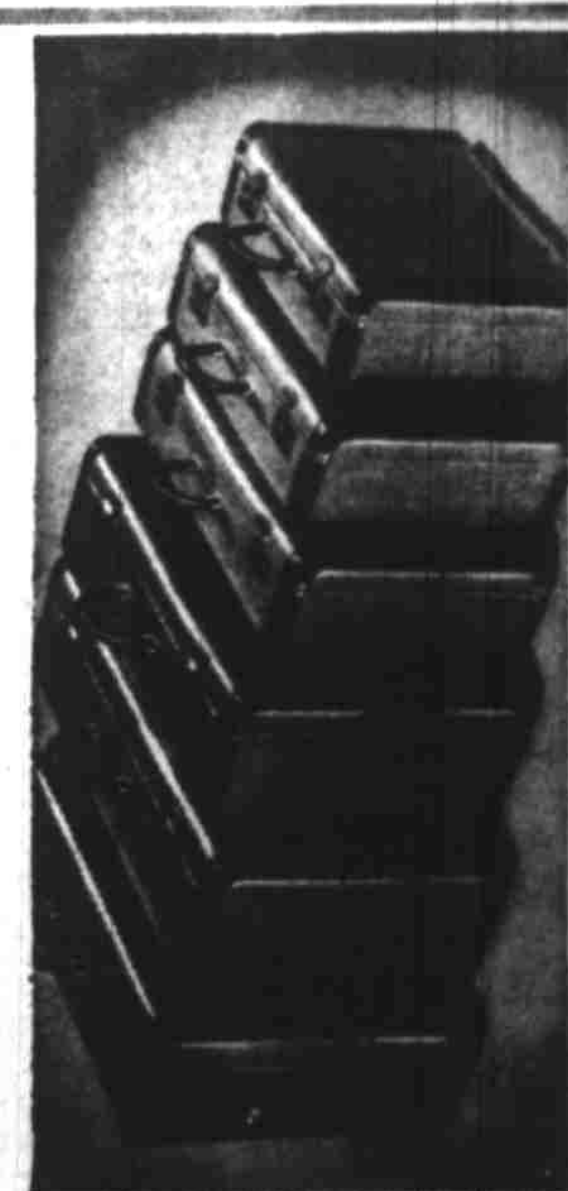
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
