Object, Flavor

Herbs by Doorstep Prove Satisfactory Gardening-Culinary Project for Cook

The woman who considers life uninteresting without a few plants of parsley and chives by her doorstep in summer, will find extra fascination in growing other herbs for use during the growing months and even into the winter.

Annual herbs are so simple to grow, and even if one does not care to go too deeply into the science of herb growing and using, a few seeds planted in spring will yield much interesting flavor with a minimum of effort.

Prepare a small plot just beside the back porch, protected from visiting animals, and sow some packets of seeds. Most any seed dealer, or grocery store where seed packets are displayed, has them for such annuals as dill, fennel, parsley, sage and chives. Some are to be purchased already started. But there are other herbs, too, which we find equally interesting.

Of course the field of cooking herbs can become quite a study, but a beginner, who likes to add extra touches to her cooking will find that even a few will be advantageous to use.

For instance, there are such pungent herbs as rosemary, sweet basil, savory thyme, peppermint of various kinds and marjoram. Our favorite use for herbs is in French omelet. Mince finely half a teaspoon or more of several herbs (we found the combinations liked best by experimentation) for a four-egg omelet.

The leaves of the herbs, dried together and crumbled in the fingers, stand near the stove to be added to gravies and sauces.

Marjoram is a particularly good herb to crumble and add to stewed tomatoes.

Harvest the leaves (which are usually the portion utilized in cooking) before the plant goes to seed. You can either dry them separately, storing in different glass containers, or mix for use during the winter. A few dried celery leaves added to the herb mixture will make good flavor.

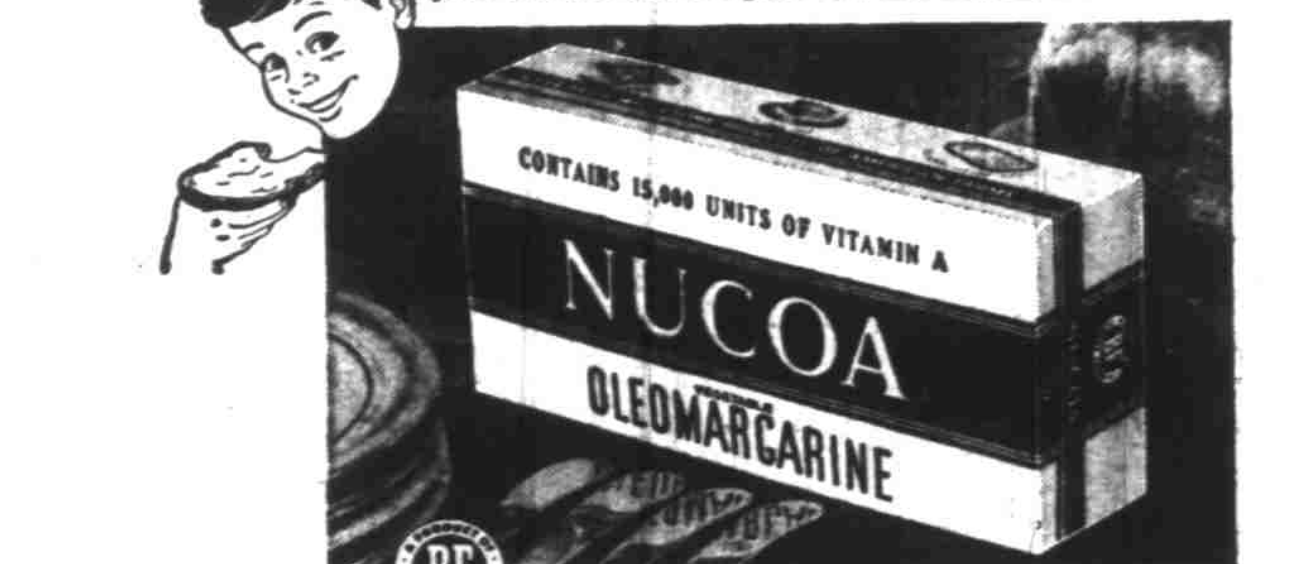
