Official Visit

National VFW President Visits on Tour of Nation; Luncheon Given

Handsome, friendly, and obviously capable, Mrs. Joseph Mann of Detroit, Mich., national president of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, finds her job as head of a half million women mighty strenuous but with many compensations. She was in Salem on Friday on an official visit, and was entertained at luncheon at the Marion hotel.

Her official duties have taken her into 39 states and to the Canal Zone since October, and she will continue on to Alaska and Hawaii before the year is up, she told the listeners to her very brief talk during luncheon yesterday.

Privately she told me that she has had only two days at home since the first of the year, and every day of her official visits are chock full of planned events, "but I love it, and thrive on it."

"But seriously," she said, "the Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary has several very worthwhile projects—and money is furnished almost entirely from within its own ranks."

Most important of the projects, Mrs. Mann told me, is the auxiliary's interest in cancer research. They are now rebuilding the summer laboratory at Jackson Memorial Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine, and have raised \$100,000 for the project.

The so-called "orphan's home" at Eaton Rapids, Mich., another VFW auxiliary enterprise was evidently close to Mrs. Mann's heart, for she explained with pride, how the home is made up of 23 individual brick houses, each for 10 children and headed by a house-mother—usually a veteran's widow.

The auxiliary has financed the building of a \$35,000 hospital, \$75,000 community center and \$69,000 nursery at the home. The latter a memorial to women in world war II. The next building to be put up will be a non-sectarian chapel and fine new guest lodge.

"And of course, the auxiliary puts two million dollars a year into cheer for veterans hospitals, giving gifts and financing programs where needed. This in itself is quite an undertaking."

All funds from these projects, she reiterated, are from within membership, except a certain percent of money from the Buddy Poppies sold to the public once a year.

Asked about the auxiliary's stand on military training, Mrs. Mann replied that the auxiliary is definitely in favor of military training, believing it to be the only way to assure peace.

Mrs. Mann is an easy speaker, friendly and with gray hair and high coloring. That she likes people was shown in her indulgence in signing dozens of programs,
