Salem Obituaries

CHICAGO, April 18.—(AP)—Grains rallied in a mid-session burst of selling today and never were able to recover from it. Extreme losses were reduced in the latter part of the session, but the tone at the close was weak and nervous.

The selling centered in corn, as it has on other days recently, when the market showed signs of weakening. The May contract dropped 7 cents from an early high. Wheat and oats followed the yellow grain lower, although their losses were not as great.

Final prices on wheat were down $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 cents, May \$2.50 $\frac{1}{2}$ — $\frac{3}{4}$, corn was 2 to 3 cents lower, May \$2.44 $\frac{1}{2}$ — $\frac{3}{4}$, soybeans 1 to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents lower, May \$11.16 $\frac{1}{4}$ —1.16, and soybeans were unchanged to 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ higher, May \$4.00.

NEW YORK, April 19-(AP)—Stocks broke through their average high of the year in today's market on a late surge of buying.

Rails, benefiting from a freight rate boost, led the way in the final hour, several at new tops for the past 19 months. Earlier demand centered on favored oils, rubbers, metals, liquors and aircrafts.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite climbed .4 of a point to 66.8, its highest level since Oct. 23, 1947. The rail average was at its best since Aug. 30, 1946, and industrials equaled their 1946 high.

Total transfers of 1,530,000 shares gave the market its 20th million-share session in the past month and compared with 2,140,000 on Friday.
