

Cities' Need for New Revenue Emphasized as Officials Meet; New Developments Explained

The common need of cities for new revenue sources was underlined Wednesday night when more than 50 officials of 10 Marion and Polk county communities talked over their municipal problems at a dinner meeting in the Salem Chamber of Commerce hall.

City administrators tax, juke box license fees, sewer rental charges and larger shares of state taxes on liquor and gasoline were among the revenue sources discussed at the meeting sponsored by the League of Oregon Cities and presided over by R. L. Elstrom, Salem mayor and league president.

Mayors and other officials of Salem's neighboring communities indicated their agreement with Elstrom's statement that cities must find new revenue sources to meet higher costs, the demands for new municipal services and the needs of greatly expanding populations.

Franken Tells Plan

Virtually all the cities represented need more revenue for sewer extensions and sewage disposal plants, the mayors stated. Salem City Manager J. L. Franken outlined Salem's new sewer extension plan, which would cost \$15,000 bond issue to finance sewage plant and interceptor sewer and to be paid off by sewer charges in coming years.

Acting Mayor J. H. Hart of Independence told that city's \$128,000 sewer improvement program of the past year and its need for \$30,000 now for sewer repairs before Independence can get into its sewage disposal project.

Junction City Plan

Herman Kehrli, the league's executive secretary, explained the Junction City plan adopted by its citizens to finance a major sewer extension and plant project for a population of only 1,700. This includes a \$298,000 bond issue, minimum monthly sewer charge of \$2 per water user, \$50 sewer connection fees. In place of sewer assessments this bond issue is being paid by a tax levy over 25 cents, totaling 15 mills at current assessed valuations.

Kehrli also explained the new Eugene amusement tax of 3 per cent on all admission price for theatres, sports events, concerts and other amusements. He said the conservatively estimated \$300,000 annual revenue from this tax is earmarked for city recreational projects.

Juke Box Fee

Mayor Hollis Smith of Dallas, a league director, who led the general discussion period last night called attention to Dallas \$60 annual license fee on all juke boxes operated in the city.

Pitbull machine license fees ranging up to \$200 a year per machine were reported by Independence, and by Woodburn. Hubbard, West Salem and Silverton.

Mayor Elmer H. Matton of Woodburn said his city has entered an agreement with an adjoining rural fire protection district to house and maintain its fire truck in return for payment of rural fire operating costs by the city.

Marine Corps Reserve Drills

Salem's marine corps reserve met Wednesday night at the Salem airport for its regular weekly drill session under the direction of Maj. Leonard Hicks, unit commander.

Included in Wednesday's class session was instruction on gun and eight drill, radio voice procedure, battery fire and chart plotting of fire and individual instruction on handling of arms.

Instructors were Sgt. Wayne Curry, Sgt. Arthur Hancock, Capt. Gene Williams and Sgt. J. Kelm. Classification of battery personnel will continue at the unit's next meeting.

Potato Men Warned Of Forbidden Areas

In order to save handlers of seed potatoes the trouble of sending potatoes into an area where they cannot be accepted, the state agricultural department has called attention that Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties constitute control areas against bacterial ring rot.

These three counties form one of the few areas in the country free from bacterial ring rot of potatoes, officials said. The present control area order applying to these counties has been in operation since 1941.

The department also reported that Washington state has put into effect a bacterial ring rot quarantine order pertaining to Irish seed potatoes.

A pending joint fire control agreement was reported by Mayor A. F. deLaplanche of Hubbard who said an adjoining district proposes a 4 mill tax levy to buy and maintain a fire truck manned by the city and eventually to become city property.

Municipal Developments
Other municipal developments were described by Mayor Jacob Bercholdt of Mt. Angel, Councilman E. E. State of Monmouth, Mayor Walter Musgrave of West Salem, Mayor Herman Hassler of Sublimity and City Manager R. E. Borland of Silverton.

Elstrom advocated before the assembled mayors, councilmen and other officials additional revenue to cities from the state gasoline tax because of the big slice of city expense devoted to street work from state liquor profits because of city policing of liquor laws, and from the state income tax surplus, because "first requirements by new population are on a local level" and because the income tax was to offset property tax. Elstrom maintained that too high a percentage of city revenue comes from the property tax — an estimated 70 per cent in a national survey.

Petition Asks Road Project Near Silverton

Marion county court has under consideration a petition presented Wednesday by June D. Drake of Silverton and 65 other residents in the area along the old Bridge Creek road east of Silverton seeking improvement of the road.

The road parallels the former right of way of the Silver Falls Logging company railroad grade which has been converted into a road. The petition asks that three bad curves on the Bridge Creek road be improved.

Attorneys from Robert Evans and Billy L. Hellman, both business lawyers, state that the road is dangerous and often impassable.

Albin E. Hattley, chairman of the Silverton school board, and Henry Alm, Silverton postmaster, declared the road to be in no condition for travel during many winter periods.

3 Youths Held For Possession Of Stolen Property

Three young men were in the city jail Wednesday charged with illegal possession of stolen property and liquor violations after they reportedly had been seen taking a hub cap off a car, Salem police said.

They are Roy W. Dunham, 21, Jefferson, charged with illegal possession of stolen property and furnishing liquor to minors; and Leland E. Prather and Donald R. Cobine, both 19, of Independence.

The youths were charged with possession of stolen property and illegal possession of liquor.

Police said the assistant manager of a theatre told them he saw the boys take the hub cap off a parked car on the 500 block on State street about 11:45 p. m.

Police said they picked up the youths in their car about 15 minutes later and found the hub cap and a quantity of beer in the vehicle.

Knife, Fork Club Elects McKinney New President

W. W. McKinney, Salem attorney and municipal court judge, was elected president of the Salem Knife and Fork club in an election held in the state employment offices Wednesday night.

Harry W. Scott, Salem merchant, was elected vice president, and William H. Balke, director of the state unemployment offices in Salem, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

House Raises Vet Ceilings

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(AP)—House approval sent to the White House today a bill raising the income ceilings for veterans going to school and those taking on-the-job training.

The house agreed unanimously to senate amendments.

Veterans without dependents would be allowed to get \$210 a month in combined wages and government subsistence allowance under the bill. The limit for veterans with one dependent would be \$270, and for veterans with two or more dependents \$290.

Ceilings now in effect are \$175 for veterans without dependents, and \$200 for those with dependents. If signed by the president, the raises would be retroactive to April 1.

MacArthur Man Denies Fear of Mac-Ike Battle

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 21.—(AP)—Warren Wright, national coordinator of MacArthur for President clubs, said today he made no statement that General Douglas MacArthur would lose to General Dwight Eisenhower in a presidential campaign.

Wright said he was misquoted yesterday as saying in an interview at Houston that MacArthur, if nominated by the republicans, would be defeated if the democrats nominated Eisenhower.

"What I said was that if the republicans were smart enough to pick MacArthur, then we would win. But if the republicans pick anybody other than Dwight D. Eisenhower, then the republicans probably are beaten," Wright said.

Salem Labor Groups Charged Under Secondary Boycott Law

Three Salem AFL labor organizations, charged with violating the state law prohibiting "secondary boycotts" by allegedly attempting to prevent delivery of concrete to a Lebanon firm, face action in the Linn county circuit court in Albany Friday.

The action was brought by the Lebanon Sand and Gravel company. It seeks a temporary injunction to prevent the Salem Building Trades council, Building Laborers union 441 and Teamsters union 224 from interfering with delivery of ready-mixed gravel to the Cascades Plywood corporation and its partner, Walder & Kenworthy Construction company.

Union representatives have been cited to appear in court at 2 p. m. Friday. At that time they are ordered to show cause why an injunction should not be issued, restraining them from interfering with the cement delivery.

A suit filed by the sand and gravel company earlier in the week alleged that the Salem unions threatened to strike the Cascade Plywood company because it was handling cement produced by the non-union Lebanon Sand and Gravel company. Walder & Kenworthy, the partner firm, is now engaged in highway construction operations near Lebanon; the suit states.

The law outlawing employment of "secondary boycotts" was passed in the 1947 legislature. It forbids any organization or individual to refuse to handle material or goods produced by a non-union company and prohibits strikes over refusal to handle non-union materials.

The hearing on the injunction will be conducted by Circuit Judge Victor Oliver. Allan Carson, Salem, will represent the unions and F. D. Mayer, Albany, the gravel firm.

Bids Opened On Salem's Naval Armory

SEATTLE, April 21.—(AP)—Industrial Building Construction company of Eugene, Ore., was low bidder on the job of constructing naval reserve training centers at Eugene and Salem, the 13th naval district announced tonight.

Amount of the bids and the list of unsuccessful bidders were not immediately available.

The bids will be sent to Washington to determine the contract award.

The Salem naval armory project which was approved in Seattle naval headquarters Wednesday was originally estimated to cost approximately \$160,000 and will be located near the ball park in southeast Salem, off 25th street.

It will include three wings, 40 by 120 feet, connected by a head house, 40 by 160 feet, and a small arms range and garage building, 43 by 71 feet. Also included in the job are an antenna platform, flagpole, driveways, parking areas and sidewalks.

The armory will house Salem navy and marine corps reserve units and will include machine and carpenter shops, electronics warfare laboratory, offices, classrooms, diesel generator room, officers' quarters, drill halls, non-com rooms and locker rooms.

Taft Challenges Stassen to State 'Liberal' Program

YOUNGSTOWN, O., April 21.—(AP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft carried his primary campaign to this steel city tonight, admitting Youngstown appeared to be his weakest spot in Ohio.

His speech tonight was in Stambaugh auditorium where six nights ago Harold E. Stassen, Taft's opponent in the May 4 voting for delegates to the national republican convention, also spoke.

He called on Stassen to say "how he is more liberal and what changes he would make in the republican program."

"I've noticed my opponent going about the country claiming he is more liberal than I am," the senator told his Ashtabula audience. "I'd like to know in what respect he's more liberal — more liberal in giving money to Europe, perhaps?"

Alabama May Start Ike Boom At Convention

A southern senator said last night (Wednesday) that Dwight D. Eisenhower would not decline the democratic nomination for president and predicted Alabama might start a "We Want Eisenhower" boom at the convention.

Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.) said he had talked with persons in recent contact with Eisenhower, and despite the general's repeated "no's" they believed he would be available.

Sparkman said Alabama had a strategic position at the convention, being first on the roll call. Gov. Earl Warren, California's favorite son for the republican presidential nomination, called a change in the national administration "essential."

In the first nation-wide speech of his campaign, Warren said the present administration is split within itself and can offer the American people no real leadership.
