Creditmen Hear Dr. L. A. Riggs

The need to "get out and grow" through experience and to live in the present and deal with it effectively was asserted to Salem Retail Credit association Friday by Dr. Lawrence A. Riggs, dean of students at Willamette university.

Dr. Riggs noted that normality is a relative concept, allowing wide variance for individuals, but that extremes usually "are not the place where we should be." People should be able to have an "outgoing experience" as well as to be able to retire to their own inner resources of power, he said.

Citing that effectiveness in society is important for the individual, Dr. Riggs declared that social aggression can be used in constructive ways as well as harmful — "we get the good we want by adding it, not by just doing away with evil."

Realtors to Vote On Limitation of 'For Sale' Signs

A move to prohibit Salem Board of Realtor members from plastering salable properties with various real estate companies' signs was proposed by the board Friday.

The by-law amendment, if passed, would prevent members from placing their signs on property without consent of the owner or without an exclusive listing. To do so would "violate the constitution of the board."

Members will vote on the proposal at the board meeting on May 7.

Architects for Courthouse Interviewed

Architect firms interested in the proposed new Marion county courthouse were interviewed by the court-house building committee.

The committee voted to meet again June 2 to make final choice on one of six architect firms interviewed. County Judge Grant Murphy, committee member, said that to date no definite plans for the contemplated building had crystallized.

It will be marble exterior, he said, and will be constructed on the site of the present structure. Judge Murphy said that a beginning of actual construction depends on availability of material, costs and financing.

The three architect firms interviewed Friday include P. Bellusch, Glenn Stanton & Hollis Johnston and Lawrence Tucker & Wallman. Three other firms were consulted about a month ago. All are from Portland.

In addition to Judge Murphy, other building committee members present included County Commissioners Roy Rice and Ed Rogers, Charles A. Sprague of Salem and Roy Clatt of Woodburn. Member Karl Steiwer of Jefferson was absent because of illness.

Services for Homer McWain Set Monday

Funeral services for Homer McWain, 61, long-time Salem resident, will be held from the Clough-Barrick chapel Monday at 3 p.m. Dr. Daniel H. Schulze officiating, with interment in Belcrest Memorial park.

McWain, late resident of 90 Fairview ave., died suddenly in Dallas Thursday afternoon while employed as foreman of a line job for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company for whom he had worked for the past 32 years.

The Polk county coroner said Friday that death was due to a heart attack.

Born at Fall City, Neb., Sept. 1, 1886, McWain moved to Kansas City Mo., where he was married in 1913. His wife, Mrs. Mary L. McWain, survives. The couple came to Salem in 1918 when McWain was transferred to the local Pacific Telephone and Telegraph service department. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World.

Surviving besides the widow are two sons, Eugene McWain of Portland and Wesley McWain of Santa Ana, Calif.; a daughter, Mrs. Nadine Trick of Costa Mesa, Calif.; three brothers, Dean McWain of Salem, Douglas McWain of Blythe, Calif., and Eugene McWain of Los Angeles; a sister, Mrs. Edwina Reiding of Long Beach, Calif., and four grandchildren.

Liquor Fund Distributed

Distribution of \$53,978 state liquor revenues to counties and city was announced Friday by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry.

The distribution represents receipts from liquor privilege taxes collected during the first three months of 1948 and are apportioned on the basis of population.

The city of Portland will receive \$15,127 and Multnomah county \$2,301. Other apportionments of \$1,000 or more include Clackamas county \$1,757, Klamath county \$1,082, Lane county \$1,859, Eugene \$1,032, Marion county \$1,660, Salem \$1,531 and Washington county \$1,453.

Hunter Kills 8 1/2 ft. Cougar

Bounty on one of the largest cougars ever killed in Marion county was collected at the Marion county clerk's office Friday.

The huge cat was killed April 7 in the area of the Little North Fork of the Santiam river by Samuel W. Kooztz, Albany route 4. It weighed more than 175 pounds and measured 8 feet 5 inches from tail to nose.

Kooztz, a Southern Pacific railway conductor, shot the animal four times with a 22 single shot rifle. His blue truck house, he said, the cat only about a mile from a mill town located five miles above Mehama.

Kooztz also collected \$250 each from the county on four bobcats he shot while hunting the cougar. During two days of trailing the cougar, Kooztz found the carcasses of four buck deer the killer had slaughtered.
