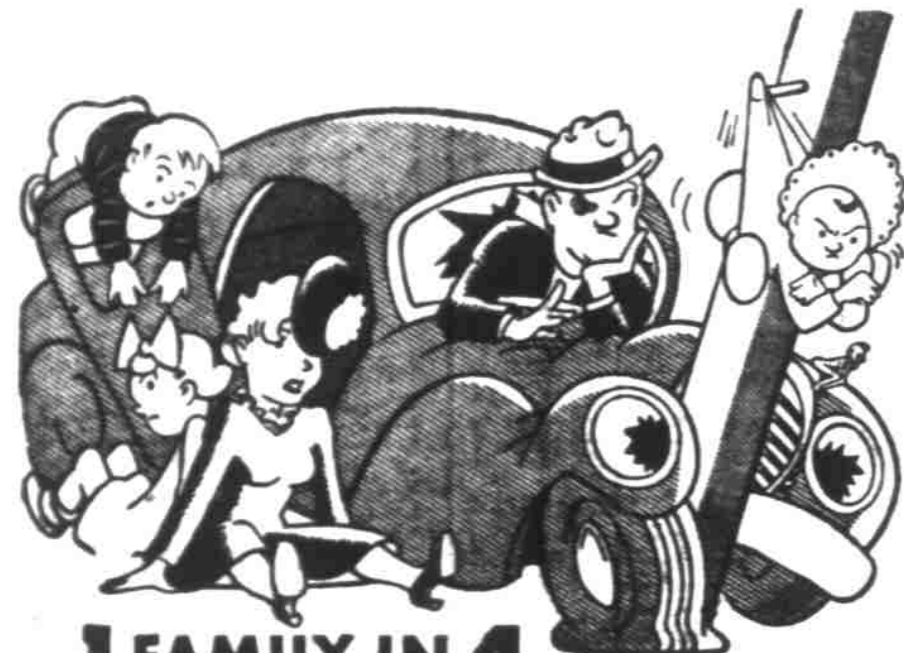

President to Go, UNESCO Sessions

At the annual state conference of the American Association of University Women in Lakeview Friday and Saturday, the state president of the Oregon division, Mrs. John O. Burcham of Salem, was elected to go to San Francisco in May to attend the sessions of the United Nations educational, scientific and cultural organizations. Mrs. Burcham is one of three state AAUW officers elected to attend the sessions. Accompanying her will be Miss Neva West of Ashland, state education chairman, and Dr. Edna Landros, University of Oregon, state AAUW international relations chairman.

Mrs. Burcham presided at the two day conference, which will be held in Portland in 1948. Eighty-eight delegates were present, representing 21 branches of AAUW in the state. Others from Salem attending the Lakeview conference were Mrs. Guy N. Hickok, state radio chairman; Miss Beryl Holt, regional fellowship chairman; Mrs. Virgil T. Golden, local AAUW president; Mrs. Vernon Wiscarson, Mrs. Albert A. Cohen, Mrs. Harry Foster, Miss Eleanor Stephens, Mrs. Charles A. Ratcliff and Mrs. E. S. Oliver.

At the conference it was reported Oregon had exceeded its goal in fellowship funds, \$1670 being obtained. As a result, the division is entitled to name three international student grants. Portland branch has named one, the Gertrude H. Cooper grant, having raised more than \$500 there. The other two named by the state are the Dr. Kate W. Jamieson one, named in honor of the retired dean of women at Oregon State college; and the Beatrice Walton Sackett grant, named to honor the late Mrs. Sackett who was a member of the state board of higher education.

Club Hears Long Range Planning

The Salem Woman's club which met Saturday afternoon in regular session heard interesting discussions on the proposed long range planning in the city of Salem. J. L. Franzen, city manager, spoke relative to sewage disposal.

W. H. Baillie discussed plans for a municipal auditorium and Roy Harland talked concerning proposed school developments. The musical portion of the program was provided by the Treble Triad of Parrish Junior high school under the direction of Miss Gretchen Kraemer.

During the business session the club voted a contribution to the cancer campaign and a collection was taken for the European Children's Relief fund.

Mrs. Frank Marshall gave a brief resume of the Marion County Federation meeting held in Medford and stated Salem would be host to the group in October. Mrs. Paul Griebow, a member of the Salem Woman's club, was elected president of the Federation. Additional recognition coming to the Salem club was the appointment of Mrs. Charles Ratcliff as Oregon's representative to the UNESCO conference to be held in San Francisco.
