gate to the Oregon Federation of Garden clubs convention June 17 and 18. Report on the Garden clubs convention at Independence last week was given.



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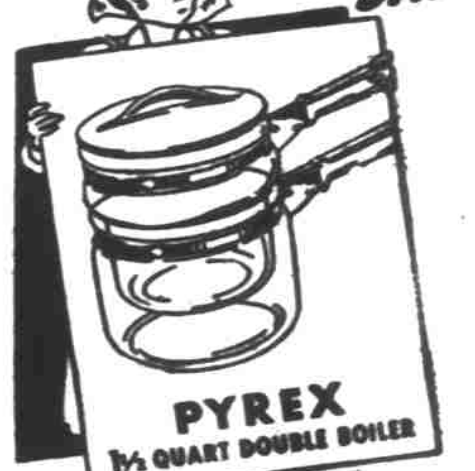
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
