Oregon counties receive 40 per cent of the total on the basis of amounts they spent for old age assistance during the year ended June 30, 1947. The remaining 60 per cent, \$24,033.44, was paid to the state public assistance fund.

Kimmell Talks To Creditmen
Warning that some practices indulged in by totalitarian governments have already seeped into this country, Rex Kimmell, assistant state attorney general, asserted Friday that "unthinking acceptance" of the American heritage might be the first step toward losing the benefits gained through the work of American forebears.

Kimmell spoke at the Salem Retail Credit association luncheon in the Golden Pheasant restaurant. The world's experience, especially since World War I, has been that "free men" had the martial discipline to defeat the enemies of freedom but not the moral discipline to insure peace," he said.

Americans should put their efforts to "outselling" the subversive ideals of other countries, he urged.

Chicken Inn Thief Sought

John Harbison, Business Man In Salem, Dies

John Wallace Harbison, prominent Salem business man and resident for the past 34 years, died in a local hospital Friday at the age of 66 years, after an extended illness.

Funeral services will be held from the W. T. Rigdon chapel Monday at 11 a. m. with Dr. Chester W. Hamblin of the First Presbyterian church officiating. Interment will be in Belcrest Memorial park.

Harbison was born at Swickley, Pa., June 8, 1881, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Rhodes Harbison. He was graduated from Princeton university in 1903 and was later married to Olive Grey Bowman at Swickley.

The couple moved to Salem in 1914 when Harbison started the Valley Motor company at Liberty and Center streets. During World War I he served with Salem's company M, 162 infantry battalion of the Oregon national guard in the Mexican border dispute.

In 1920 Harbison became associated with the old Watt and Shipp Sporting Goods company on State street, operating that business and later operating a

garage and service station here. He purchased the Associated service station at North High and Chemeketa streets in 1930 and operated the business until the time of his death.

A member of the Salem First Presbyterian church, Harbison served on the board of deacons from 1942 until 1946. He was also a member of the Salem Elks lodge.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Olive Grey Bowman Harbison; two sons, Sam B. Harbison of Salem and John Wallace Harbison, Jr. of Medford; a daughter, Mrs. Jane Juza of Lebanon and three grandchildren, Joan Grey Harbison and James Wallace Harbison, both of Salem, and Sally Jo Juza of Lebanon.

Stadter Reviews Trusts' Record
Oregon trust companies have a "very good record" in regard to ethical trust practices, Ed Stadter, jr., local attorney, said before the Salem Board of Realtors Friday.

Stadter spoke at the board's weekly noon luncheon in the Marion hotel. He explained the

history and workings for various kinds of trusts. Stadter said trusts came into being as the result of various historic developments in the early 1800s, including chartering of the first railroad, formation of the first public school district, developing of trans-oceanic steamship travel and the discovery of petroleum.

Stadter noted that trust companies are regulated by law and are regularly inspected by state and federal bank examiners.

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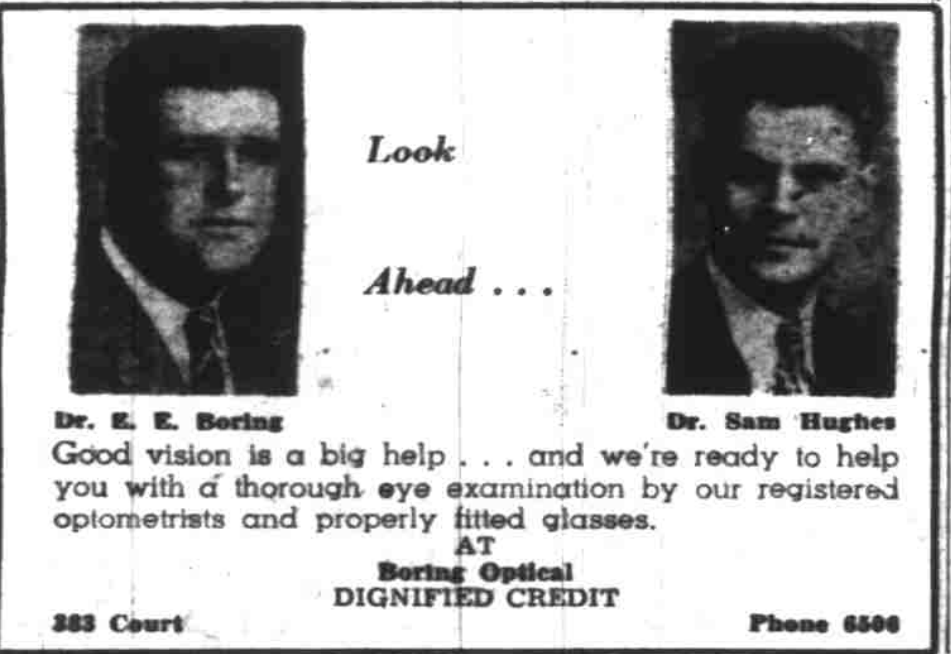

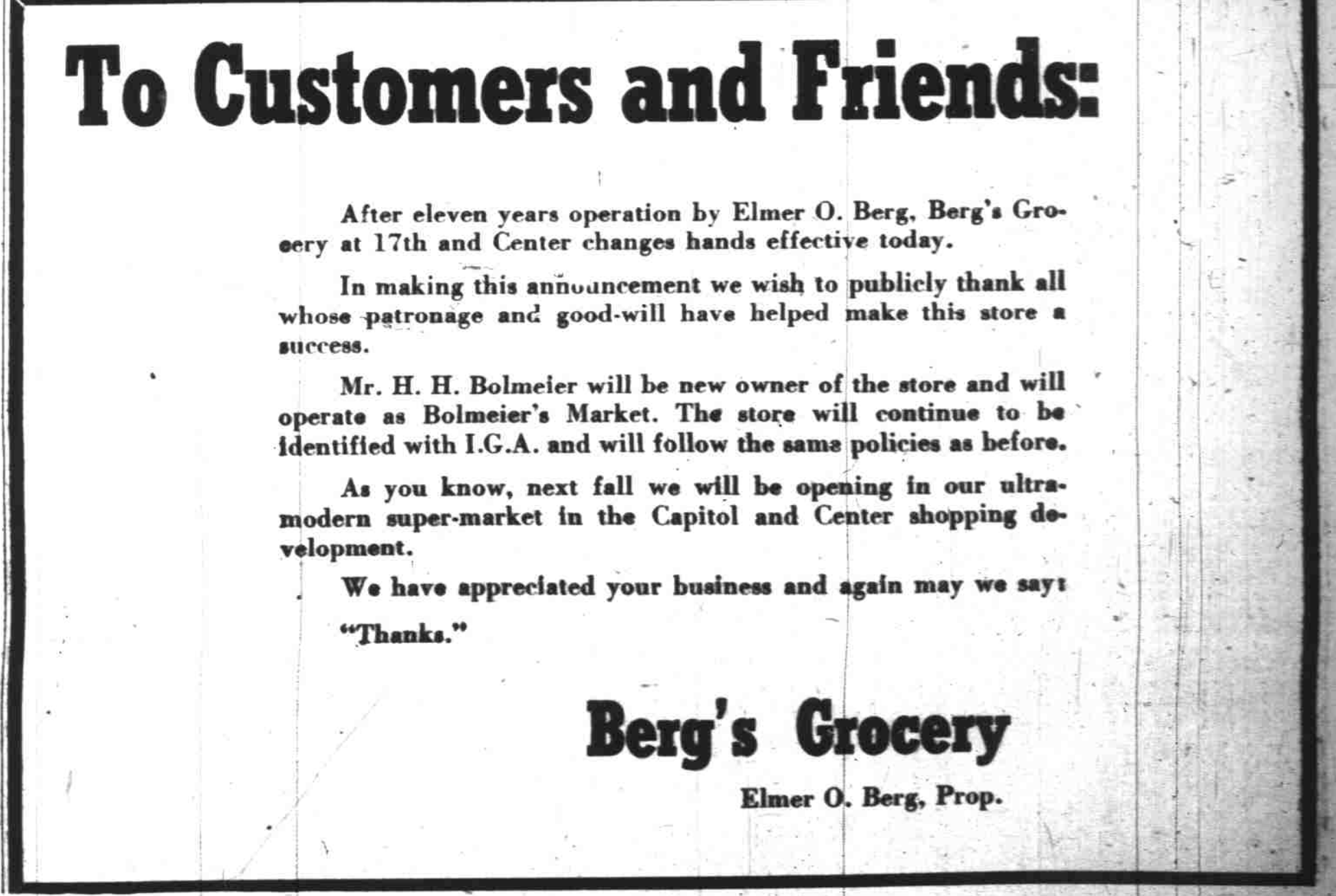
