Auto Registration Rises 12 Per Cent

Oregon motor vehicle registration for the first quarter of 1948 is up 12 per cent over the same period last year, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby reported Friday.

All registered vehicles totaled 512,224 to surpass the 457,525 recorded in the first three months of 1947. Passenger cars accounted for 397,094 of the total, an increase of nearly 40,000 and approaching the entire 1947 passenger registration of 407,186, Newby said.

Four Corners Roads to Join County System

A decision to incorporate two roads in the Four Corners area into the county road system was reached by Marion county court Friday.

The roads are LaBranch avenue from Lancaster drive to Mable street and Mable street from LaBranch avenue to East State street.

Four Corners rural fire protection district had requested the court to take over the roads and improve them. Purpose is to disable fire fighting equipment to better cover the district.

The county court Friday also decided to postpone until June 4 a request for improvement of eight streets lying on the north edge of Salem just east of Cherry avenue.

Residents in that area have requested the county to take over the dedicated streets and to improve them. The county court declined to assume jurisdiction of the streets but instructed the county engineer to prepare an estimate of the area's road improvement costs.
