

## Guest Pianist Plays With Orchestra

Dr. Karl Trebitsch, pianist, will be the guest soloist with the Willamette university symphony orchestra in its final concert of the year on Tuesday, May 11. He

will play the Concerto No. 1 in E flat by Franz Liszt. The concert is scheduled to begin at 8:15 p. m. at Leslie Junior high school auditorium.

Professor of piano and organ at the Whitman college conservatory of music at Walla Walla, Dr. Trebitsch has been highly acclaimed as a concert pianist here and in Europe. He was born and educated in Vienna and studied under Leschetzki, a teacher of many prominent pianists.

Under the direction of Frank Fisher the university symphony orchestra has become well known to Salem audiences. Tuesday night's concert marks its third appearance this year. In addition to the concerto the program includes several contemporary works.

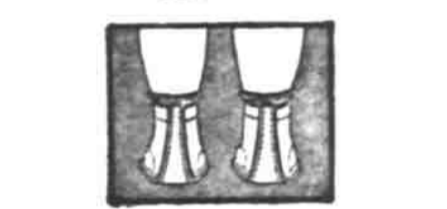
