

2. We plant "co-ax" with giant plows like this. Every eight miles a "booster station" keeps calls going through clearly. For - incredible as it seems - high frequency waves fade so rapidly in the cable that all the sun's energy, if it could be funneled into the pipes, would not earry half-way across the country.

4.
