

Dewey Terms Soviet-U.S. Talk Plan 'Best News Since V-J Day'

ONTARIO, Ore., May 11—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey today called proposed settlement of Soviet-American differences "the best news since V-J day."

But at the same time he warned that the United States must "deal from strength" if it is to accomplish more than simply accord communism "a temporary setback in its 100-year-old goal of world domination."

His voice still hoarse from laryngitis which kept him confined to his room in Bend over the week end, Dewey appraised the prospects of U.S.-Soviet consultation before an open air rally this afternoon on the high school athletic grounds.

Dewey flew here from Bend this morning in a resumption of his campaign for Oregon's republican primary balloting May 21 for the presidential nomination.

"Very Good News"
"We had very good news today," Dewey told a crowd assembled from eastern Oregon and neighboring western Idaho.

Cheers followed his announcement that Russia was prepared to open negotiations on points of difference with the United States at the invitation of the American ambassador to the Kremlin.

"If they mean it," Dewey declared, "it is the best news since V-J day. If they don't mean it, well—it will be just what has happened about once every six months."

No Appeasement
But, this time, he added, American diplomacy must be prosecuted "with vigor and skill" to avoid "any repetition of the tragic mistakes" of Yalta, Potsdam, Teheran and the Moscow conferences. "I hope that we have finally learned as a nation that you cannot buy peace by appeasement. All you do is make trouble."

"So as we view this announcement with cautious cheer, let us remember why it occurs."

"It didn't occur just because the Soviet does that every six months. It occurred because for the first time since V-J day our government has at last been showing some strength of character."

"It was only a week ago that the senate overruled the administration and voted a 79-group air force. It was only a month ago that we voted a six billion dollar Marshall plan program."

"Now, at last, largely by reason of the prodding of the republican party, the administration has taken a firmer stand."

"Now, at last, we are beginning to see prospects of settling some of these differences around the table."

'Seamless Web'
"When it occurs—if it occurs—we must remember that this is one seamless web of problems from China to Italy, from Finland to Korea."

Dewey's every reference to improved prospects for peace was greeted by applause.

Salem Unit of Army Reserve First to Train

Salem army reservists will comprise the first 6th army reserve unit to receive field training when the local headquarters unit for 360th engineer boat and shore regiment reports to Fort Warden, Wash., Sunday for a two-weeks training period.

Capt. Richard Reynolds, Salem reserve army instructor officer, said an advance party of Col. George Spaur's regimental headquarters here will leave Thursday and remainder of the 15 officers and two enlisted men comprising the unit will leave this weekend.

At Fort Warden the Salem unit will operate a headquarters of the regularly stationed 2nd Engineer Special Brigade (with regular regiments comparable with the reserve units), will learn of new developments in amphibious warfare, study basic navigation and piloting and fire marksmanship courses. Two Portland battalions the 36th will join the Salem unit for training at the Washington camp.

The local unit was cleared for the camp Monday night when Capt. Winfield H. Needham gave physical examinations.

Besides the unit instructor and the commanding officer, these men will comprise advance party: Maj. Keith N. Flory, S-2; Maj. John Catrall, S-3; Maj. Vinton L. Green, S-4; Capt. Richard N. Chase, S-1; Capt. George W. Laird, assistant S-3.

Jews Capture Base on Road To Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, May 11—(AP)—The Jewish army said today its fighters had captured Beit Mshar, main base for Arab forces in the battle for control of the vital Jerusalem-Tel Aviv highway.

The Arabs launched a counter-attack in Bab El Wad gorge, through which the highway winds. (An Arab army communiqué issued in Damascus said Arab fighters had surrounded 4,000 Jewish soldiers at Bab El Wad and had them under artillery fire).

As the fighting raged in the hills to the west, Jerusalem went into its fourth day under a cease-fire order with not a single shot fired.

First Aid Men Find Men Dead

Two men died suddenly in Salem Tuesday, apparently due to heart attacks. The victims were Alex Dulle of Portland and Benjamin F. Klinger, 237 Richmond st.

First aid men found Klinger dead when they arrived shortly after 6 p.m. at his home. No information was available from the Clough-Barrick mortuary as to survivors or funeral arrangements.

Alex Dulle, employee of Columbia Wire and Iron company, died about noon near the Sears Roebuck warehouse on South Liberty street, where he was engaged at installing elevator doors. A fellow employee said Dulle was apparently in good health early in the morning but complained of not feeling well. He had suffered a stroke about a year ago.

A warehouse employee found Dulle in his car near the building, where he was found dead when first aid men arrived. The body was sent to J. P. Finley and Son mortuary in Portland, according to the coroner's office.

Fights Greet Anti-Red Movie

NEW YORK, May 11—(AP)—First fights broke out and after-theater traffic was snarled tonight when the Catholic war veterans clashed with pickets protesting the showing of the movie "The Iron Curtain."

The picketing and fights were stopped by a force of 180 police half an hour later.

Police said pickets began marching in front of the Roxy theater, where the film opens tomorrow, about 11 p.m.

The placard-carrying pickets identified themselves as members of the New York committee against war propaganda.

Advertisements for the film said it was "based on the personal story of Igor Gouzenko, former code clerk, USSR embassy in Ottawa, Canada."

Boeing Union Due in Court

SEATTLE, May 11—(AP)—The Seattle local of the striking Aero-Mechanics union (IAM) and four of its officers today were ordered to appear in superior court and show cause why they should not be held in contempt of court for mass picketing.

The order was issued in response to an application of the bomber-producing Boeing Airplane company, strikebound for 20 days.

The company contended that the union continued to the large numbers of pickets after the order had been served.

Boy Suffers Abrasions When Struck by Car

Charge for Milk Cartons Held Invalid

A state agricultural department order setting a one-cent extra charge for milk sold in fibre cartons was declared invalid Tuesday by the state supreme court.

The court held that dairies cannot be forced to charge the extra cent under the authority of Department Director E. L. Peterson to fix minimum prices for milk. The decision did not deny a dairy power to charge more if it desires. The opinion, written by Justice James T. Brand, affirmed Circuit Judge George R. Duncan of Marion county in a suit originally filed by nine dairies operating principally in Portland.

The court also upheld the conviction of Dr. Fred Jeannet, Portland chiropractor, under three years penitentiary sentence for manslaughter. Dr. Jeannet was convicted of performing an abortion operation on a Salem married woman, from which she died. In appeal from Marion county Judge E. M. Page was affirmed.
