



This community is one of only 175 selected communities in U. S. to be visited by one of the six caravans now touring the country for the Security Savings Bond drive.

The U. S. Security Bondmobile will be in front of Miller's Department store today from 12:00 noon until 2:00 o'clock. The decorated scroll will be on view to all during the visit here according to Sid Stevens, County Chairman of Security Bond drive. - Everyone purchasing a bond will be eligible to sign the scroll which will be presented to the city to be made a part of the permanent collections in the archives of the community.
