### The New Look in Security Is Coming Here

Tour of bondmobile is under auspices of Trailer Coach Manufacturers' Association and United States Treasury Department.

### At Miller's Today 12: to 2:

Residents of Salem will be given the opportunity of signing a gold scroll and having it autographed by Sec. of State Newby and Mayor Elstrom upon the purchase of Security Savings Bonds when the Security Loan Bondmobile comes to Salem Friday. This community is one of only 175 selected communities in U. S. to be visited by one of the six caravans now touring the country for the Security Savings Bond drive.

The U. S. Security Bondmobile will be in front of Miller's Department store today from 12:00 noon until 2:00 o'clock. The decorated scroll will be on view to all during the visit here according to Sid Stevens, County Chairman of Security Bond drive. Everyone purchasing a bond will be eligible to sign the scroll which will be presented to the city to be made a part of the permanent collections in the archives of the community. Every person thus signing will have his name enrolled as having purchased a share in our country. U. S. Savings bonds are actually Security Bonds, security for the individual as well as for our country.

The Bond caravans consist of six big house-type trailer coaches, each of which is 25 feet long and weighs 2500 pounds. They are decorated in red, white and blue trim and carry the official Security Loan insignia. They have a complete public address installation. Five of the outfits will start from Chicago and one from Los Angeles. It is expected that they will have reached well over 50% of the nation's population by the end of the Security Loan campaign June 30.
