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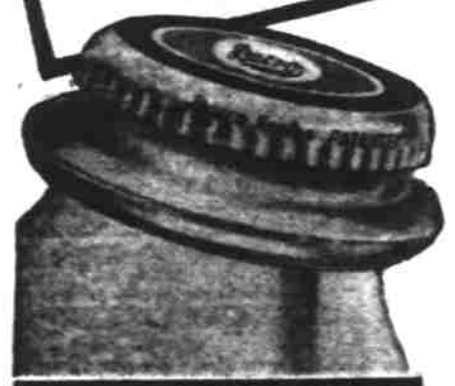

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WHO SHALL BE GOVERNOR?

Who Shall Be Governor?
By Ben Buisman
The Grange Declaration of Purposes states:
"It is the right for every member to do all in his power legitimately to influence for good the action of any political party to which he belongs. It is his duty to do all he can to put down bribery, corruption and trickery; to see that none but competent, faithful and honest men, who will unflinchingly stand by our interests, are nominated for all positions of trust."
In September, 1946, when Representative John H. Hall was campaigning for the speakership of the House, the Oregon Grange Bulletin stated editorially as follows:
"A political chameleon who usually aligns himself with the liquor and gambling interests when the chips are down, Hall has gone to considerable length to gratify his ambition to become speaker and to wield the extensive power which is an emolument of that office. That he would always use that power to further the public weal is not demonstrated by his past record as a legislator."
Little did we dream at that time his success in that campaign would eventually land him in the Governor's chair and give him a running start on the field in the present gubernatorial race.
At the risk of being charged with violating a basic Grange precept of not engaging in partisan politics, we made that editorial comment in 1946. Then only the speakership of the House was involved. Today it is the titular leadership of the sovereign state of Oregon.
It would be dereliction of editorial duty if we did not at this time assert that nothing has happened in the interim to change our 1946 appraisal of the man.
