Performances will begin at 2:30 and 8 p.m. Doors to the menagerie will open at 1:30 and 7 p.m. A horse fair in which prize ribbons thoroughbreds are exhibited will also be found on the circus lot.

Beatty, the featured performer of the show, twice during the day will present his spectacular wild animal act.

Sharing honors with her famous husband, Mrs. Clyde Beatty will present a unique trained wild animal act in which she directs performances of a royal Bengal
