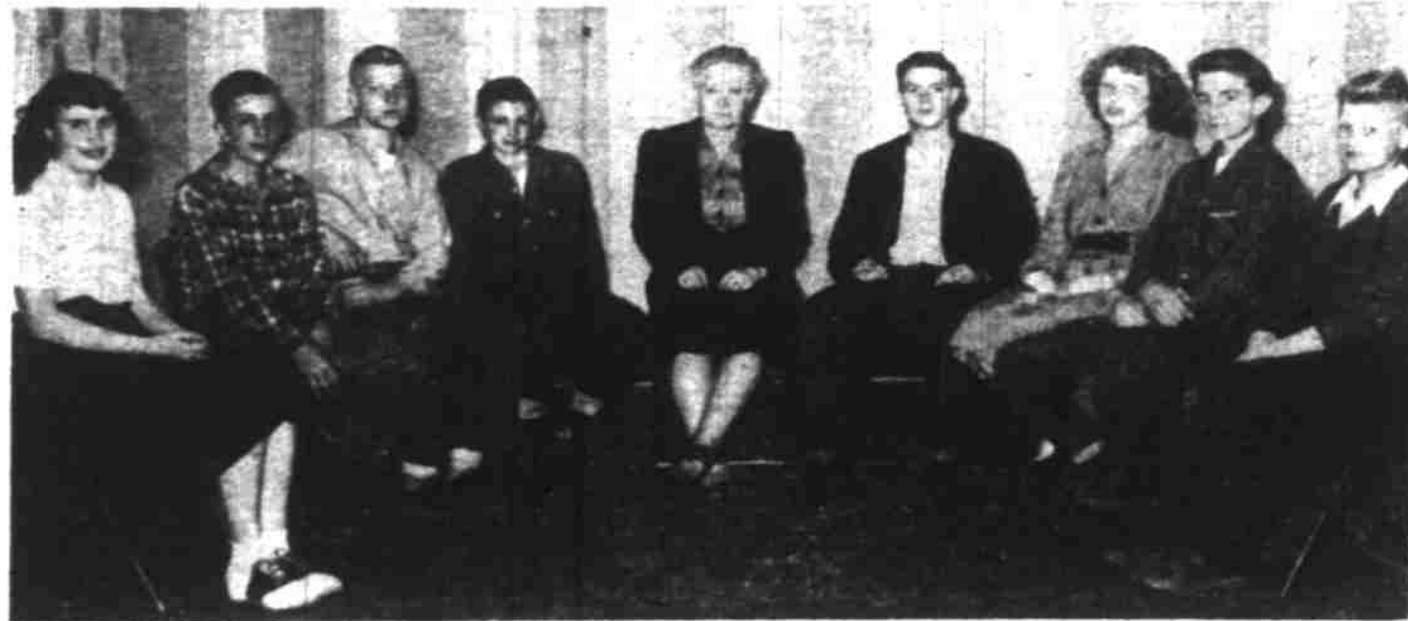


## Hazel Green Graduates Eight in Early Exercises
