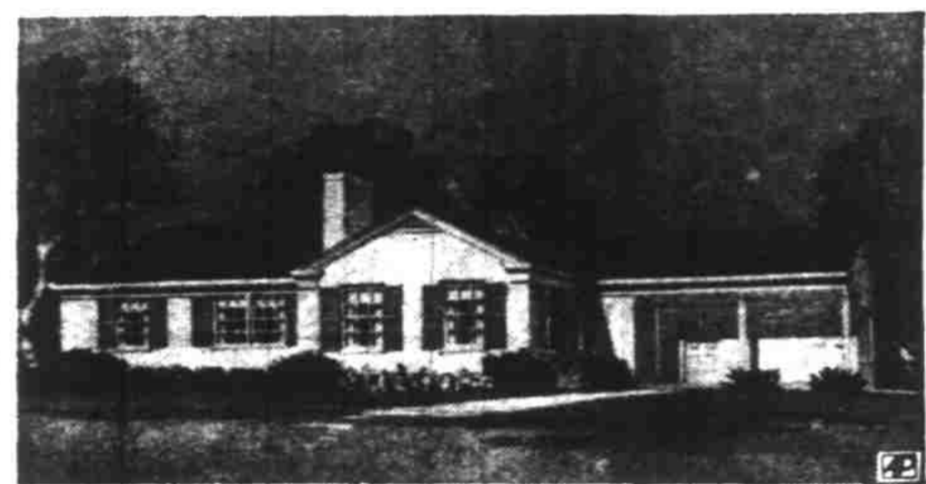

'Home-of-the-Week'

A modern interpretation of Colonial tradition, this plan can be used on either a wide or narrow lot. Bertram A. Weber, 221 North LaSalle st., Chicago 1, Ill., is the architect. He finds this style popular because it "imparts an air of grace and dignity to any site."

Plan W-500, this house includes six good-sized rooms in approximately 1,500 square feet, exclusive of porch and garage. A part basement accommodates heating plant and laundry.



Among major specifications, the architect suggests an exterior of common brick, painted white with green shutters and a black asphalt shingle roof. The plan offers interesting possibilities for orientation. As shown here, a location on the east side of a street would give the house morning sun in kitchen and dining room, with a southwest exposure for living room. The open plan of living and dining areas provides an unbroken width of 30 feet.
