Wallace Lays Partial Blame for Palestine War on United States

SEATTLE, May 21—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace said today the United States is indirectly responsible for bloodshed in Palestine. The third party presidential candidate told a news conference the United States is assisting Britain financially, and Britain in turn is financing and leading Arabs in the battles of Jerusalem. "That amounts to blood on our hands," Wallace said.

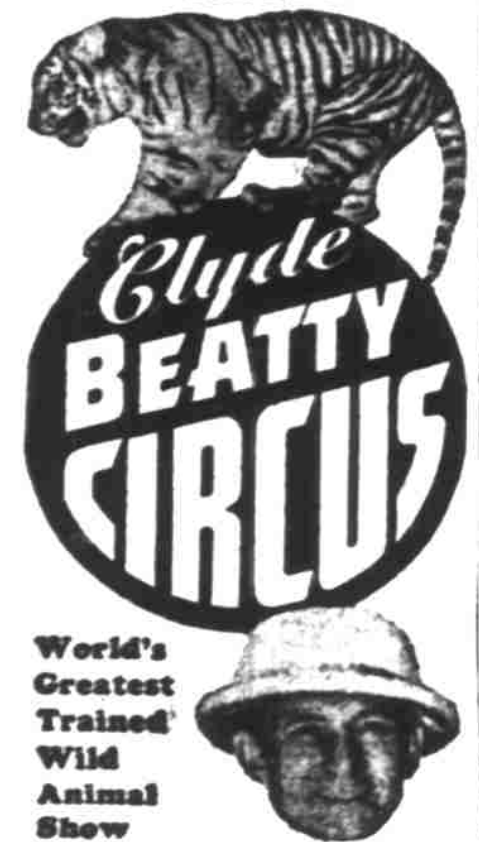
Wallace, in the interview and at a meeting near the University of Washington campus, criticized activities of the Washington state legislative un-American Activities committee.

After his off-campus speech Wallace answered written questions from the audience, including a query whether he would accept communist support.

"If the communists are working for peace with Russia," he replied, "God bless 'em. If they are working for the overthrow of the government by force, they know I'm against them. If the communists want to support me—okay—but they must do it on my terms."

PORTLAND, May 21—(AP)—This sad saga was recounted by county detectives Gus Schirmer and Henry Brown today: John H. Haggard, 21, Boring, and juvenile companion entered a Troutdale home and got a fine haul. A tin can, hidden in a closet, contained a \$1,000 bill and \$56 more.

They spent the \$56, then tried the \$1,000. Nobody would cash it. After repeated tries to get the big bill changed, they got so discouraged they went to give it back to the owner. Then they were arrested.

Movie Writers Fined, Jailed

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—Two of the Hollywood writers who defied the house un-American activities committee in its communism quiz got the news today: A year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

The two, Dalton Trumbo and John Howard Lawson, were permitted to remain at liberty under bond, pending appeals to higher courts. They and eight others still to be tried refused to give the house committee a "yes" or "no" answer to question whether they were members of the communist party. They were indicted on charges of contempt of congress.

Official Quits As Daughter Hired by Reds

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—A sorrowing father, who broke with his 22-year-old daughter because she took a job with a communist news agency, resigned a high government post today to spare his boss embarrassment.

"My daughter, though a girl of high ideals, is only 22 and in my judgment is simply being exploited," said John C. Virden, head of the office of industry cooperation in the commerce department.

The daughter, Euphemia Kirkpatrick Virden, is a telegraphist at the Washington office of Russia's Tass news agency. Her employment had been exposed by Rep. Crawford (R-Mich) with a request that Secretary of Commerce Sawyer ask Virden to quit.

This Sawyer refused to do, but Virden insisted that he leave at once because of the publicity "and the embarrassment that this is likely to cause you." He later agreed to stay on temporarily to train a successor.

The daughter of Virden is a graduate of two exclusive schools for women, Westover school in Connecticut and Sarah Lawrence college in New York.

Senate Upholds Truman Veto

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—By a four-vote margin, the senate today upheld President Truman's veto of a bill which would have let key senators order FBI probes of persons nominated to the atomic energy commission. (Sen. Cordell voted to override the veto while Sen. Morse voted against the plan.)

Voting to override the veto were 47 senators, including 38 republicans and nine southern democrats. Against overriding were 29 legislators, including 27 democrats and two republicans. A two-thirds vote, or 51, was needed to override.

The bill was passed by the senate April 12 by voice vote and by the house by unanimous consent May 3.

Mr. Truman vetoed it last Saturday. The bill would have affected only the five atomic commission members and the commission's general manager. It provided that when a majority of the nine senators on the senate-house atomic committee asked for it, they could get a check on an appointee by the federal bureau of investigation.

Shirley Temple Claims Elephant Unfair Competition

HOLLYWOOD, May 21—(AP)—Grant Cooper, attorney for Mrs. John Agar, the former Shirley Temple, announced tonight he had called upon the Rogers Brothers circus to cease and desist from using advertising posters with her name.

"The posters give the impression that Miss Temple is appearing with the circus," said Cooper. "They are an infringement upon her name and constitute unfair competition. I have a poster which says 'See Shirley Temple with Rogers Brothers Circus, East Liverpool, Ohio, May 15'."

Cooper said that the Shirley Temple with the circus is an elephant.

Accident Near Eugene Fatal to Baby; 3 Hurt

EUGENE, May 21—(AP)—A car carrying a young family to their Los Angeles home crashed into a bridge abutment today, killing the baby, seriously injuring the 21-year-old mother and hurting three others.

Dead is Bonnie Thompson, 6 months. Mrs. Emery Thompson suffered a brain concussion. The father, Emery Thompson, 26, received face lacerations.

The Thompsons' older child, 18-month-old Tommy, was the least seriously hurt. An Everett Wash., girl travelling with them, Fern Anderson, 16, broke her nose.

The Thompsons were driving from Everett to Los Angeles when the accident occurred north of here near the junction of the Pacific highway and Irving road.

Navy Reserve Officers Meet

Salem naval reserve officers met at the chamber of commerce Friday night to make plans for organizing a local chapter of the Navy Reserve Officers association.

The meeting was called by Carl Cover of Salem, reserve navy commander. Cover announced that the movement for forming the local chapter is definitely under way. He also discussed the possibility that the NROA may merge with the Reserve Officers association which already has a chapter in Marion county.

Lewis May Face New T-H Act Point

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—Attorneys for the national labor relations board worked today preparing plans for a possible Taft-Hartley law injunction requiring John L. Lewis to bargain with the Southern Coal Producers association.

NLRB officials said no definite decision has been made to seek a court injunction. They declined to comment further.

But it became known that the lawyers were rushing their investigation of the "refusal-to-bargain" charges filed against Lewis' United Mine Workers by the southern group.

NLRB to Bow to State Laws on Union Shop

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—The national labor relations board decided by a 3 to 2 vote today that it will not hold elections to determine whether employees want a union shop in any state which has a law prohibiting the union shop.

The decision, which affects 10 states, was based on the Taft-Hartley act, which permits the union shop if a majority of the employees sign in an election conducted by the NLRB that they want it and state laws do not prohibit it.

Arab World Told to Avoid Discrimination

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—The United States today demanded the release of 41 American citizens taken off the American steamship Marine Carp by Lebanese authorities under threat of force.

At the same time the state department served notice, in effect, on the Arab world that this country will "view seriously" any discrimination against U.S. citizens on grounds of race, creed or color.

The 41 Americans, all Jews, were removed from the Marine Carp at Beirut on Wednesday, along with 28 passengers of other nationalities.

All 69 were of military age and were bound for Haifa in the new Jewish state of Israel. Lebanese officials took the position that they might join Jewish fighting forces there.

Today's sharp American protest was disclosed in the form of instructions to Lowell Pinkerton, U.S. minister at Beirut.

Cat Obtains Free Bus Ride

KLAMATH FALLS, May 21—(AP)—That gray tomcat which got here by mistake from Los Angeles is lost again today.

A load of bus passengers who pulled into Klamath Falls yesterday had been troubled by a plaintive meowing somewhere in the bus' entrails. The source couldn't be found.

In the garage here, a mechanic cut a hole in the bus toward the sound. A tired cat padded out from where he had been wedged between the gas tank and chassis.

While bus employees were still trying to decide what to do with him, he vanished.

House 'to Pass' Bill Which Would Open Salem Plant

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—Passage of a bill which Rep. Norblad says probably would give the Columbia Metals Co. Plant at Salem, Ore., material for producing fertilizer was predicted by Norblad today.

The Oregon republican has introduced a bill giving the commerce department control over basic fertilizer material (nitrogenous compounds). It would allocate the material for export and local use.

"We hope that this will give us a sufficient allotment to reopen our Salem plant," Norblad said. He said inability to obtain materials forced the plant's closure.

Gromyko Backs U.S. Plan to Halt War in Palestine

LAKE SUCCESS, May 21—(AP)—Andrei A. Gromyko demanded today that the United Nations stop the Arab-Jewish war in Palestine without further ado.

Gromyko said the council must accept an American proposal for strong action.

He blasted a British plea for peaceful mediation as insufficient and accused Britain of quibbling.

Meat Handlers Strike to End in Three Plants

CHICAGO, May 21—(AP)—The 67-day nationwide CIO meat handlers strike—marked by occasional rioting and bloodshed and mobilization of national guard troops in two states—was called off today against all of the meat packing industry except Wilson and Co. The strike was ended on company terms.

The United Packinghouse Workers union called off the work stoppage after the workers voted in favor of a back to work movement at Swift, Armour and Cudahy plants. Nearly 100,000 were on strike.

Philip Weightman, international vice-president of the union, said today's action ended the strike only at Swift, Armour and Cudahy plants. He said it was expected the strike would also end at Rath, Morrell and other struck smaller packers. However, he added that depended on "local circumstances."

The union accepted the nine cents an hour increase it rejected before calling the strike March 16.

Truman Signs Airforce Bill

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)—President Truman signed the 70-group air force bill into law today but served notice that he may not approve spending of the full \$3,198,100,000 voted by congress for aviation.

Mr. Truman's statement reopened a controversy which began when his administration recommended keeping the present 55-group armada but strengthening it. Congress, by an overwhelming vote in each house, upped the nation's future air strength to 70 groups. Provision has been made in the bill, however, that the funds shall not be spent without consent of the president.

"To assist me in discharging this responsibility," Truman said, "I have asked the secretary of defense and the director of the bureau of budget to formulate and recommend appropriate procedures."

Weather Stalls Annual Call For Workers

Continued wet weather throughout the state and here has retarded the demand for farm labor and probably will delay the early seasonal peak until the latter part of June.

This was the report late this week of Earl R. Lovell, director of the Oregon state employment service, based on a survey of 35 local employment service offices.

Because of the steadily increasing in-migration from other states, no outside recruitment of farm workers is being planned at this time, Lovell said.

Berry pickers in the mid-Wilamette valley will not be called for until mid-June, while cherry picking may get under way late in June or early July—much later than usual. Poor pollinization has decimated valley cherry orchards, while stands in the hilly regions near Salem may come through with about one-half a normal crop, it was reported.

Meanwhile, non-agricultural placements continued to climb during April, reaching 5,128 in 29 local employment offices, but were down to 4,468, the commission reported.

During the month, 290 handicapped persons received jobs. Of these 55 were skilled or semi-skilled, 42 went into clerical or professional work and the remainder were unskilled or accepted service jobs.

Of the 3,521 veterans placed, 459 were skilled or semi-skilled and 192 went on professional or clerical jobs. The remainder, including 654 short-time jobs, were in service work.

Woman Calls on Police to Look for 24 Human Heads

INDIANAPOLIS, May 21—(AP)—Miss Minnie Langley asked police today to look for 24 human heads. She said they were taken from a suitcase in her trailer home.

Homicide detectives settled back in their chairs after she explained she had inherited them from an uncle. The uncle got them years ago in Africa. They were shrunken.

Miss Langley also missed \$1,200 in \$100 bills.
