SCIO, May 29—Despite unfavorable weather throughout the spring, Linn county's 10th annual Fat Lamb and Wool show held here today brought out more entries both in number and interest than any previous show. Hundreds of visitors lined the streets during the morning parade and lamb show, as well as attending the afternoon dog trials.

Roy Ward, Portland, judged Mrs. Con Donahue's fleece grand champion among the 50 exhibited. Reserve champion went to Stephana Holec. In the 4-H division Phyllis Ann Herman, Corvallis, won the purple ribbon and Jessie DeVaney, Jefferson, held the reserve. Jim Ruby won the special award for having the most entries in the show and Nel Donahue won the prize for the best combination of lamb and fleece in the adult section. In the 4-H section Roy Ruby and Betty Stellmacher won the wards for the combinations.

Ward announced that the best 4-H fleeces would be taken to Portland to compete in the International Pacific fall wool show.

Weaving Special Feature
A weaving demonstration by Mrs. C. A. Cleaver, Albany, was of a special feature of the show, as was also a blue baby afghan hand dyed, woven and spun from wool. Williamette valley sheep.

Of the 102 lambs judged by Harry Lindgren, Corvallis, who was judging for the ninth consecutive year, Glenn Hawkins of Shedd had the best pen of three with Floyd Edwards, Albany, and Lloyd Purdy, Scio, runners-up.

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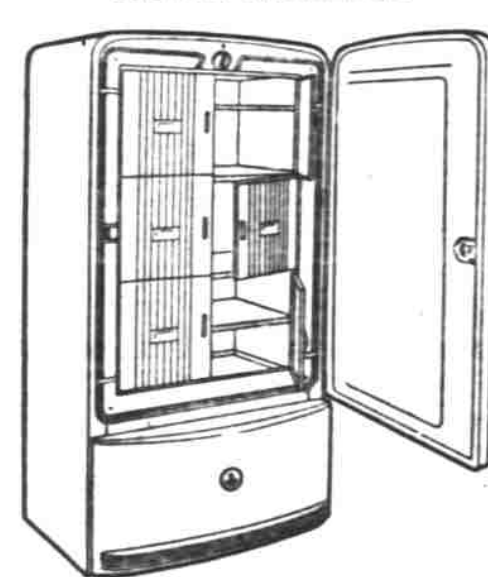
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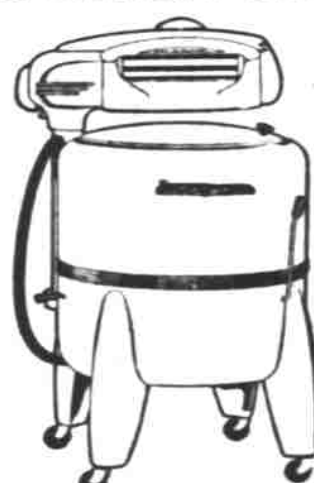
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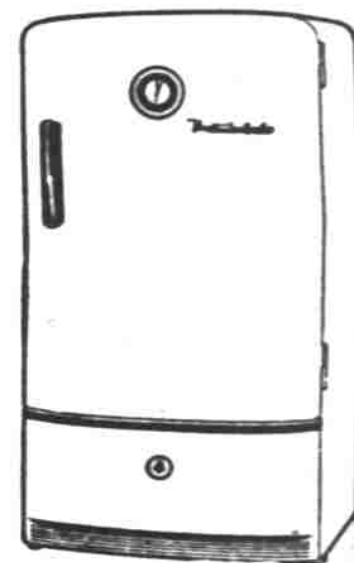
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
