Pianist to Play With WU Band

Featured soloist with the Willamette university concert band Wednesday night at 8:15 in Waller hall will be Prof. Ralph Dobbs of the university music faculty. He will play the first movement from the piano concerto in A minor by Grieg, accompanied by the band. This being the first performance of the band transcription of considerable interest. Maurice Brennen is director.

The second half of the program will be of a somewhat experimental nature in the varied types of American music and their adaptation to the concert band. Composers represented will be MacDowell, Kenton, Dvorak, and a band senior, Charles Thomson. While Dvorak is not an American, his New World Symphony is so replete with American influence that the finale is included. The composition by Charles Thomson is a sextet for varied winds: two clarinets, alto saxophone, horn, trombone and tuba. The transcriptions of MacDowell were done by another senior, Alan Robertson.

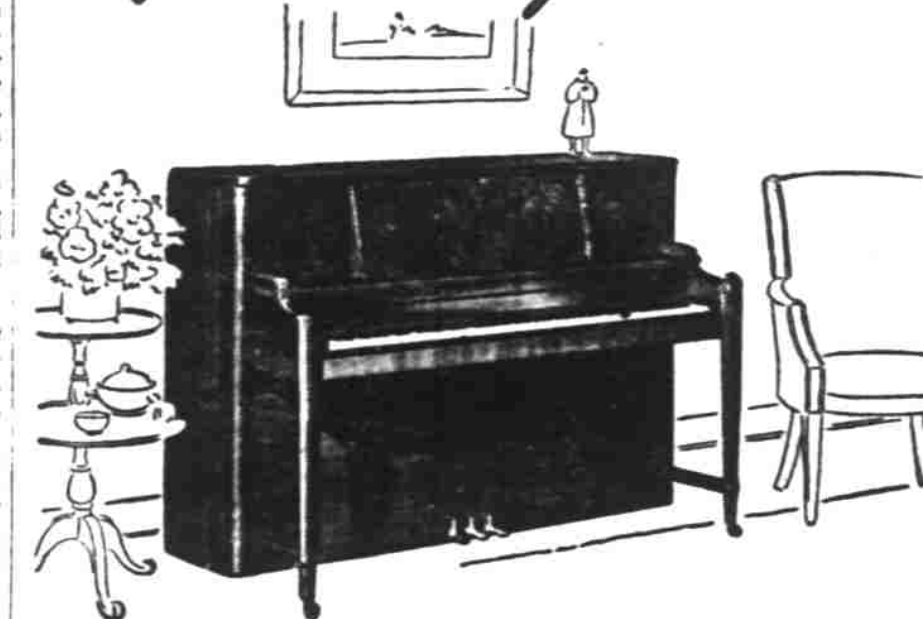
The wedding date has not been set. Both the young people are graduates of Salem schools, she is employed at Penney's and he with a sawmill.

The annual iris show and open house will be held at the Cooley Iris gardens in Silverton this week. The gardens will be open at noon today and will continue open all until until 10 each day next week.

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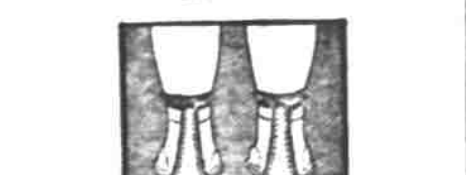
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"Holly" Says
