Need to Preserve Democratic Ideals in Solving American Problems Asserted by Swift

A spiritually and militarily strong America must preserve the democratic ideals for which its war dead fought, the Rev. George Swift said in a Memorial day address here Monday.

The rector of Salem's St. Paul Episcopal church spoke from the steps of Marion county courthouse following the traditional parade and memorial services yesterday morning. He addressed several hundred onlookers and members of local patriotic and veteran groups.

American high school and college boys and young fathers died that we might have freedom, the Rev. Mr. Swift said. "We must begin now to solve the old problems and to meet the new problems of communism."

This can be done, he declared, by preserving a strong America which would also give the United Nations the courage it needs. This country needs to be armed with the sword of the spirit as well as the breastplate of righteousness, he stated.

America can aid the cause for peace, the minister noted, by being fair and just in its international dealings; by making democracy work at home; by showing foreign peoples that democracy is superior to any other form of government and by preserving a "family of nations."

Memorial day ceremonies began at City View cemetery Monday morning with services sponsored by the Women's Relief corps of the GAR and American Legion posts.

Floral services honoring marine corps and navy dead took place on the Marion-Polk county bridge at 10 a.m. The 1,000 parade participants left Marion square at 10:30 o'clock under the direction of Maj. Reginald Williams, who replaced Brig. Gen. Harold G. Maison as grand marshal.

The parade included a marine corps color guard, two platoons of local national guardsmen under Capt. Burl Cox, and members of about a dozen patriotic and veterans organizations marching in automobiles.

Bands and students from Salem senior high, Parrish and Leslie junior high schools were preceded by marching majorettes. Boy Scouts and Sea Scouts, Salem Cherrians, Eagles lodge, and the Oregon Mounted posse also took part.

Traditional placing of wreaths on the War Mothers memorial statue on the courthouse square took place under the direction of James Turnbull.

Frank Smith, Ex-Resident, Dies on Coast

Frank C. Smith, former Waldo Hills district resident, died Saturday from a heart attack while shopping in Seaside, it was reported here Monday.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 10 a.m. in the Catholic church in Hillsboro and interment will take place at Mt. Calvary cemetery, Portland.

Smith was the son of the late Martin and Elizabeth Smith and was born in Defiance, O., Feb. 9, 1878. He came to Oregon with his parents in 1891 and settled on a large farm east of Shaw.

He was married to Theresa Benedict at Sublimity in October, 1911. They lived on a farm near Oak Grove school until 1920 when they moved to Hillsboro, where Smith was engaged in the feed and seed store business until his retirement to Seaside in February, 1947.

Surviving, in addition to the widow, are a daughter, Mrs. Bernadine Crampton of Glendale, Calif.; six sisters, Mrs. Ella Boedigher and Mrs. Barbara Gehlman of Stayton, Mrs. Emma Doerflinger of Shaw, Mrs. Josephine Barr of Mt. Angel and Mrs. Janet Doerflinger and Mrs. Dorothy Zielinski of Salem.

A brother, George Smith, died in Stayton four years ago.

Norblad 'Shocked' at ECA's Choice of 'Most Expensive'

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) protested to the economic cooperation administration today against what he called "shocking" selection of the most expensive available items for shipment to Europe.

In a letter to Administrator Paul G. Hoffman, the congressman referred specifically to bids recently closed on hospital equipment for Greek-Turkish relief.

"I am informed," he wrote, "that bids were not requested for the usual type of equipment found in almost all United States hospitals and physicians' offices, but specified only the very best."

He said he had checked supply catalogue lists and found the cost of the specified items in many cases four or five times as much as the price of the ordinary, serviceable, conventional types.

In a statement issued along with a copy of his letter, Norblad cited such items as a stainless steel treatment chair at \$315, compared with \$63.60 for the enameled type such as Norblad said his own hospital uses; a stainless steel kitchen utility truck for hauling garbage cans and such, at \$300, compared with \$57.85 for a galvanized steel one such as the congressman said most hospitals here have to use; and stainless steel clothes hampers at \$61.60, as against \$14 for galvanized.

Arabs Ponder Truce Request

AMMAN, Trans-Jordan, May 31 (AP)—The political representatives of seven Arab states met tonight to draft an Arab reply to the United Nations' latest call for a cease-fire in the Palestine war.

The Arab league's political committee, meeting in the Trans-Jordan capital with King Abdullah, includes the premiers of Syria and Lebanon, the Egyptian foreign minister, the Iraq deputy foreign minister, a Saudi Arabian cabinet minister and a Yemenite prince.

The latest security council appeal for an end of the Holy Land fighting would establish a four-weeks cease-fire period. According to the deadline set by the council, Arab and Jewish replies to the request must be filed by 6 p.m., Eastern standard time, tomorrow.

Wainwright Urges Renewed Request For Mac's Return

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright suggested today that Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur could come home from Japan in response to a "formal (senate) committee request for his appearance."

Last Friday MacArthur messaged the senate appropriations committee, in response to an invitation to testify on problems of the Orient, that "my return at this time would be misunderstood and condemned by many as politically inspired."

Today, the national MacArthur for president clubs said it had been authorized by Wainwright to release a Wainwright request that the senate committee consider the matter further. Wainwright, hero of Bataan, was in Alton, Ill., today. Wainwright's request said that MacArthur doubtless regarded the previous call for him to testify as a "mere invitation."
