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Housing Bill Expected to Die in House

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—A leading democrat said today "it looks like" congress will fail to enact the Taft-Ellender-Wagner long range housing bill. He predicted democrats will make housing one of the principal issues of the presidential campaign.

Rep. Spence of Kentucky, senior democrat on the house banking committee, told newsmen all indications are that comprehensive home-building legislation will be sidetracked in the drive to adjourn congress two weeks from Saturday.

"If so," he said, "housing will be one of the big issues in the presidential election."

The T-E-W bill, passed by the senate, has been before the house banking committee since April 23. In hearings before the committee thus far only supporters have been heard. Some 60 persons have requested time to speak in opposition to the measure.

"The democratic membership of the banking committee wants the bill sent to the house floor for action," Spence said. "The housing situation is one of the most critical situations in America and something should be done."

Meanwhile, a leading republican told reporters privately that it is "increasingly unlikely" that a housing bill anywhere near as far-reaching as the T-E-W measure can pass before congress adjourns.

One of the authors of the T-E-W bill is Senator Taft of Ohio, a candidate for the republican nomination for president. The senate passed the bill by voice vote April 22. A similar bill died in the house banking committee two years ago.

The new T-E-W measure is designed to bring about the construction of 15,000,000 new homes in 10 years, principally by private enterprise with various government encouragements.

Major opposition in the house banking committee is directed at a provision for construction of 500,000 public housing units in five years. That dwelling, to be operated by local housing authorities with federal financial aid, would be available to low income families unable to afford houses built by private industry.

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Red Cross Aid Funds Set for Flood Victims

The Statesman was informed by wire Monday that Basil O'Connor, president of the American Red Cross, has informed Gov. John Hall that \$250,000 was being made available for flood sufferers immediately.

The notification to the governor read:

"I am deeply shocked to learn of the tragic disaster that has swept Vanport and other sections of Oregon. All Red Cross chapters in the area have been mobilized to meet relief needs of disaster sufferers. Disaster workers have been sent in by the national organization to assist the affected communities and we have today appropriated \$250,000 to meet the initial emergency needs of the disaster victims."

"I have instructed Ramone Eaton, vice president and manager of our Pacific area at San Francisco, to make sure that all needed Red Cross assistance is supplied and to coordinate Red Cross activities with those of your public officials."
