Vice Squad Decoys Make Betting Pay

PHILADELPHIA, June 1.—(AP)—The city is reaping a profit on its vice squad decoys. Plainclothesmen Frank Wolf and Stephen Cambers for four

months have pretended to be bettors in a drive to snare bookmakers and numbers operators. Inspector Craig Ellis said today the two not only caused more than 50 arrests but laid their bets so shrewdly that they cleared a profit of \$200. A check for that amount was sent to the city treasurer.

Speed Sought In Appeal of Tax Test Suit

Attorney Dean Ellis of the state tax commission conferred in Portland Tuesday with attorneys in connection with speeding up notice of appeal to the state supreme court in the case of former governor Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the The Statesman, to restrain transfer of surplus state income tax revenues and corporate excise taxes to the state's general fund.
