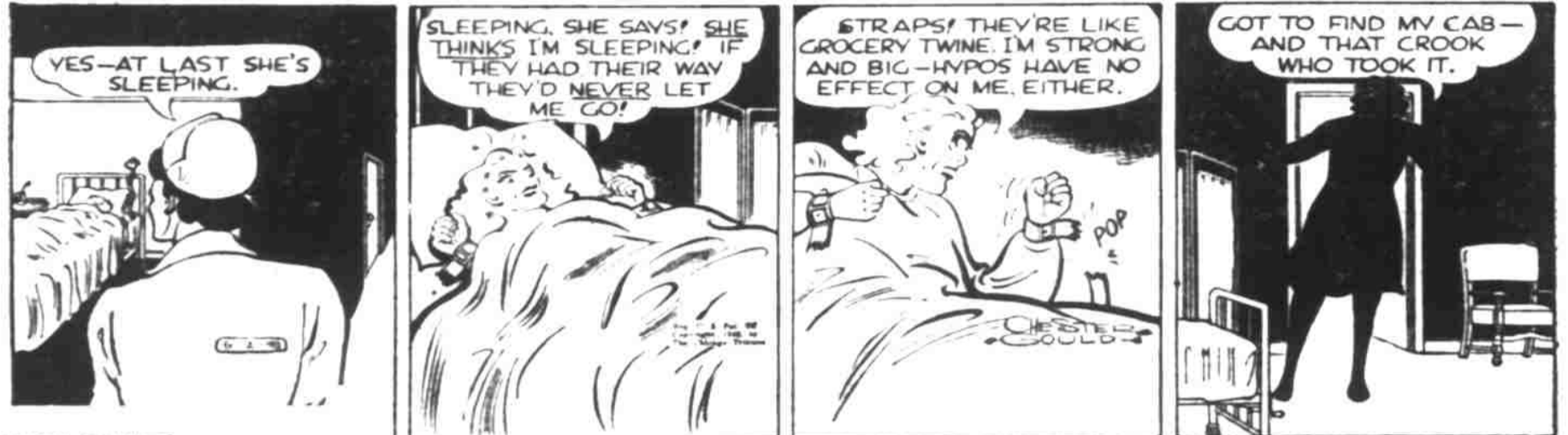

Jewish Planes Hit Capital of Trans-Jordan

AMMAN, Trans-Jordan, June 1 (AP)—Jewish airmen blasted Amman with high explosive and incendiary bombs today in the first attack on an Arab capital. Arab officials said six Arab civilians were killed in the surprise attack.
Tonight the Syrians announced that their air force had struck back in an attack on the port of Nahariya, setting big fires and sinking two boats in the harbor north of Acre. The Syrians said they also raided the settlements of Dan and Kafar Geladi in the north.
(Dispatches from Tel Aviv said unconfirmed reports there were that the Jews had been compelled to turn their attention to the Egyptian threat to their capital from the south. They said full-scale fighting had broken out in that direction.)
(The Israeli army said its troops had slashed into the 20-mile inland flank of the Egyptian column moving up the coast. The spearhead had penetrated to near Yibna within about 14 miles of Tel Aviv, an advance of about 6 1/2 miles. The Jews said they had captured Beit Tima, three miles from the Egyptian supply road and 18 miles below Yibna.)
(At Lake Success it was announced that both Jews and Arabs had accepted the U. N. cease-fire plan for four weeks. The Jewish communication, however, contained "assumptions" which appeared to condition the acceptance.)

Clayton Rejects Compromise on Tariff Bill
WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—William L. Clayton, special adviser to Secretary of State Marshall, today in effect rejected the so-called Vandenberg compromise on extension of the reciprocal trade agreements act.
The house has passed a bill to continue the law one year beyond June 12 with an amendment authorizing the tariff commission to fix limits within which trade concessions could be made without undue injury to American industry.
Under the house measure, if the president went beyond such limits, his action would be subject to congressional veto.
Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) last week expressed his opposition to a veto by congress. But he said he favors the provision by which the tariff commission could set a safety limit.
Today the senate finance committee began hearings on the house-approved bill and Clayton, former undersecretary of state for economic affairs, was the first witness.
Clayton sharply criticized the house measure because of its delegation of bargaining authority to the tariff commission, and because it would continue to act only one year instead of three, as the administration wants.

Meeting on Airshow Slated

What effect the bustle of emergency activity at McNary field will have on the Salem Chamber of Commerce air show set for this Sunday was not known Tuesday night, but a meeting with civil aeronautics authority officials this morning is expected to clarify the prospects.
The junior chamber was continuing with plans for the exhibits and races registered for the show.
The group received Tuesday a letter that President Truman would be unable to attend the show, for which he was given a special invitation, since the itinerary of his cross-country tour does not bring him to Oregon that early.

Salem Budget Meet Tonight

A proposed city budget whose preliminary draft is balanced and within the 6 per cent limit will be considered for the first time at 8 o'clock tonight by the Salem budget committee, meeting in chamber of commerce rooms.
The mayor, councilmen and eight citizen members have had copies of the draft, worked out by City Manager J. L. Franzen, since last week.
The proposal calls for expenditures of \$1,369,422 up from \$1,091,984.71 for the current year. The general fund tax levy would be \$307.636.

Two Treated For Injuries

Injuries caused by a falling truck and an exploding jar were treated Tuesday by city first aid men.
Robert E. Boyer, 1225 Hoyt st., suffered head lacerations and neck pains when a truck in which he was replacing a spring slipped off a jack Tuesday afternoon. Boyer, who was working for Viesko and Post, contractors on a Hoyt street project, was taken to a physician for treatment.
Mrs. Everett Klopp, 857 Gaines st., suffered first and second degree burns of the face and arm when a glass jar exploded as she was canning spinach at her home last evening.

Pilots Slate Richland Hop

Plans for a breakfast hop to Richland, Wash., on June 13, for all interested fliers, were announced in Salem Tuesday by Capt. James E. Cannon, commander of Salem civil air patrol squadron. Other hops will be made to Hood River and Lakeview later in the summer.
Participants in the Richland flight, to be followed at 10 a.m. by an air show and contest, are to register with Lt. Wade Dickenson of CAP. Due to flood conditions, CAP radio is keeping in touch with plans.
