

State Senate Assured of Many Changes; Six Representatives Nominated to Higher Positions

Returns from the May 21 primaries left one factor assured today in regard to the 1949 Oregon state senate—it will have more new faces than has obtained for any legislative session in many years.

Of the 30 members, 12 are holdovers — including Sen. Douglas McKay, G.O.P. gubernatorial nominee, and Sen. Howard Beilton, republican nominee for state treasurer. If the latter two are elected to higher offices (in which case county courts would name their successors), exactly one-third of the senate is assured of remaining intact—10 holdover members.

Ten Are Holdovers

These 10 are Sens. Allan Carson of Marion county, Orval D. Thompson of Linn, Truman Chase of Lane, Angus Gibson of Lane-Linn, Dean Walker of Benton-Polk, Eugene Marsh of Yamhill, Irving Rand of Clackamas-Columbia-Multnomah, Rex Ellis of Multnomah-Umatilla-Union, Carl Endahl of Umatilla, and Austin Dunn of Baker. Thompson and Dunn are democrats; the others are republicans.

Of the remaining 18 members of the 1947 senate, three have died — Sens. Marshall Cornett, Klamath Falls; Merle Chessman, Astoria; and Lee Patterson, Portland. Six others did not file for re-election — Sens. W. W. Baldere, Grants Pass; Lew Wallace, Portland, democratic nominee for governor; Walter Pearson, Portland, democratic nominee for state treasurer; P. J. Stadelman, The Dalles; George P. Winslow, Tillamook; and Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry. Ashland. Two more were defeated for renomination — Sens. Ernest Fatland of Condon was ousted by Stewart Hardie, Condon publisher, and J. N. Jones of Juntura was beaten by Elmo Smith of Ontario, former publisher.

Win Re-nomination

The other seven won re-nomination — Sens. Thomas Parkinson (r) of Roseburg, W. E. Walsh (e) of Coos Bay, Paul L. Patterson (r) of Hillsboro, Frank H. Hilton (r) of Portland, Jack Lynch (r) of Portland, Thomas Mahoney (d) of Portland and C. H. Zurcher (r) of Enterprise. All have opposition in November.

Seven members of the house of representatives entered the race for senate nomination and all but one — Rep. A. H. Bengtson of Medford, won places on the November ballot.

Jews Oppose Limitation on Immigration

LAKE SUCCESS, June 5—(AP) An Israeli spokesman said today any effort to limit Jewish immigration would be a serious blow to the proposed Palestine cease-fire.

The new Israeli statement stressed once more the delicate nature of the cease-fire negotiations and indicated that the immigration issue might wreck the entire project.

Count Folke Bernadotte, United Nations mediator, informed the security council last night the immigration question alone was obstructing agreement on a truce date.

Bernadotte asked the council for guidance in interpreting the cease fire resolution of May 29. Faris El Khouri of Syria, council president for June, replied the council had authorized the mediator to make his own interpretations of the resolution.

The Israeli spokesman expressed surprise that Bernadotte had asked for interpretation of the immigration clauses.

Gilray Appointed To Clockmakers Board

Appointment of Josiah F. Gilray, Portland, as a member of the Oregon board of examiners in watchmaking and clockmaking was announced by Gov. John H. Hall Friday. He succeeds the late F. A. Dielschneider. George H. Miller, La Grande, was appointed justice of the peace for the La Grande district to succeed the late George H. Currey.

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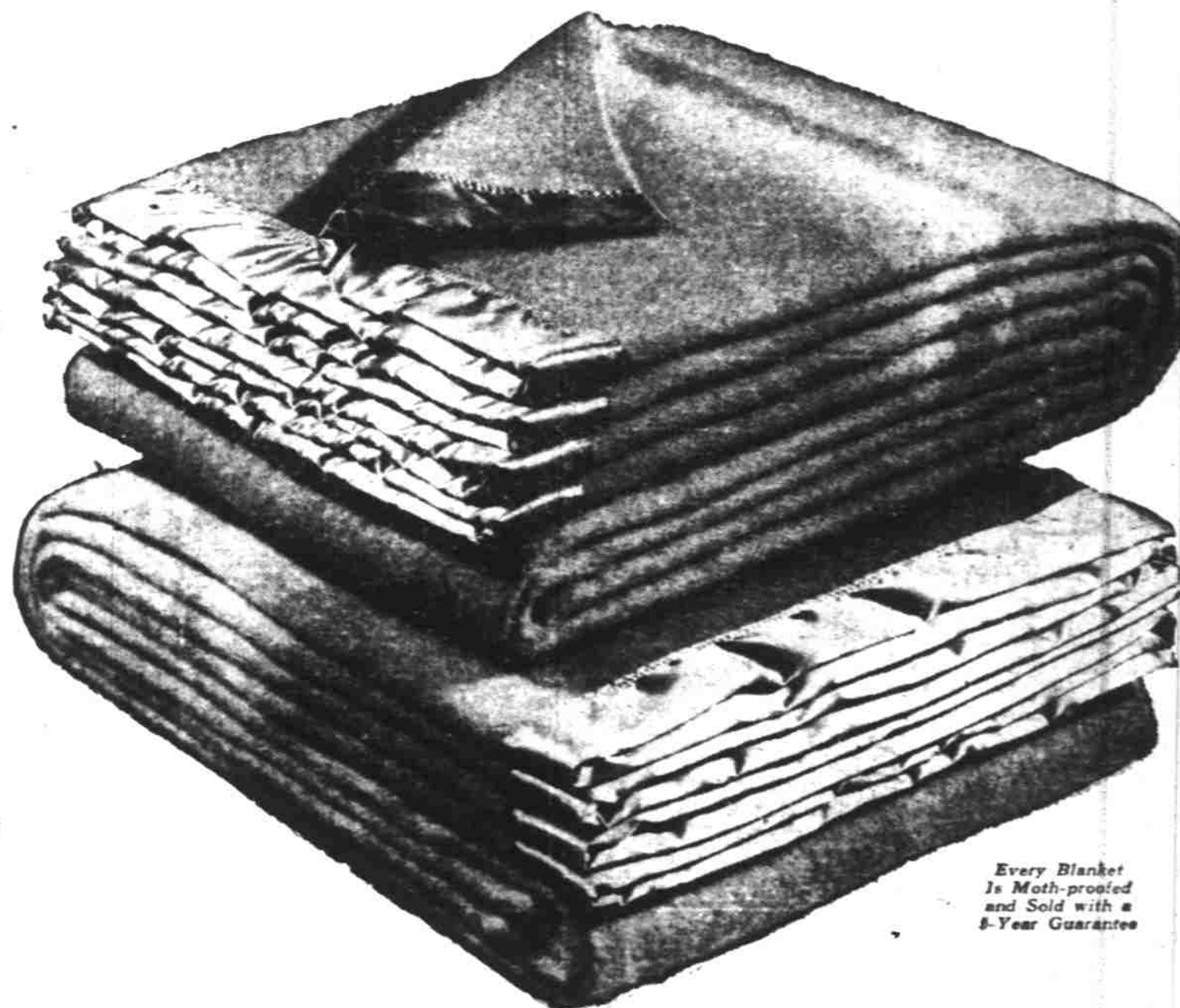
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
