Man Charged With Buying Gun from Boy

Harry Richard Hughes, 2210 N. Church st., charged with buying a stolen gun from a juvenile now under arrest for larceny from five local autos, faces preliminary examination in Marion county district court next Thursday, city police said Saturday.

Hughes was arrested by city police Saturday on a district court warrant charging him with buying, having and concealing stolen property. Police allege Hughes purchased a .25 calibre automatic pistol from one of three youths being held at the juvenile ward in Salem Memorial hospital for looting seven cars in north Salem recently.

Police said the revolver was stolen from the home of George Osborn in Salem. Officers charge that one boy stole the pistol, traded it to another of the trio who in turn sold it to Hughes. The gun has not been located, police said.

Hughes was brought to district court Saturday and pleaded innocent to the charge. He is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$750 bail.

Police said the three boys, two of them 13 and the other 14, admitted taking the pistol, and a 22 rifle, a fishing pole, reel and tackle, a camera and several blankets in their car prowls. Most of the loot has been recovered, police stated.

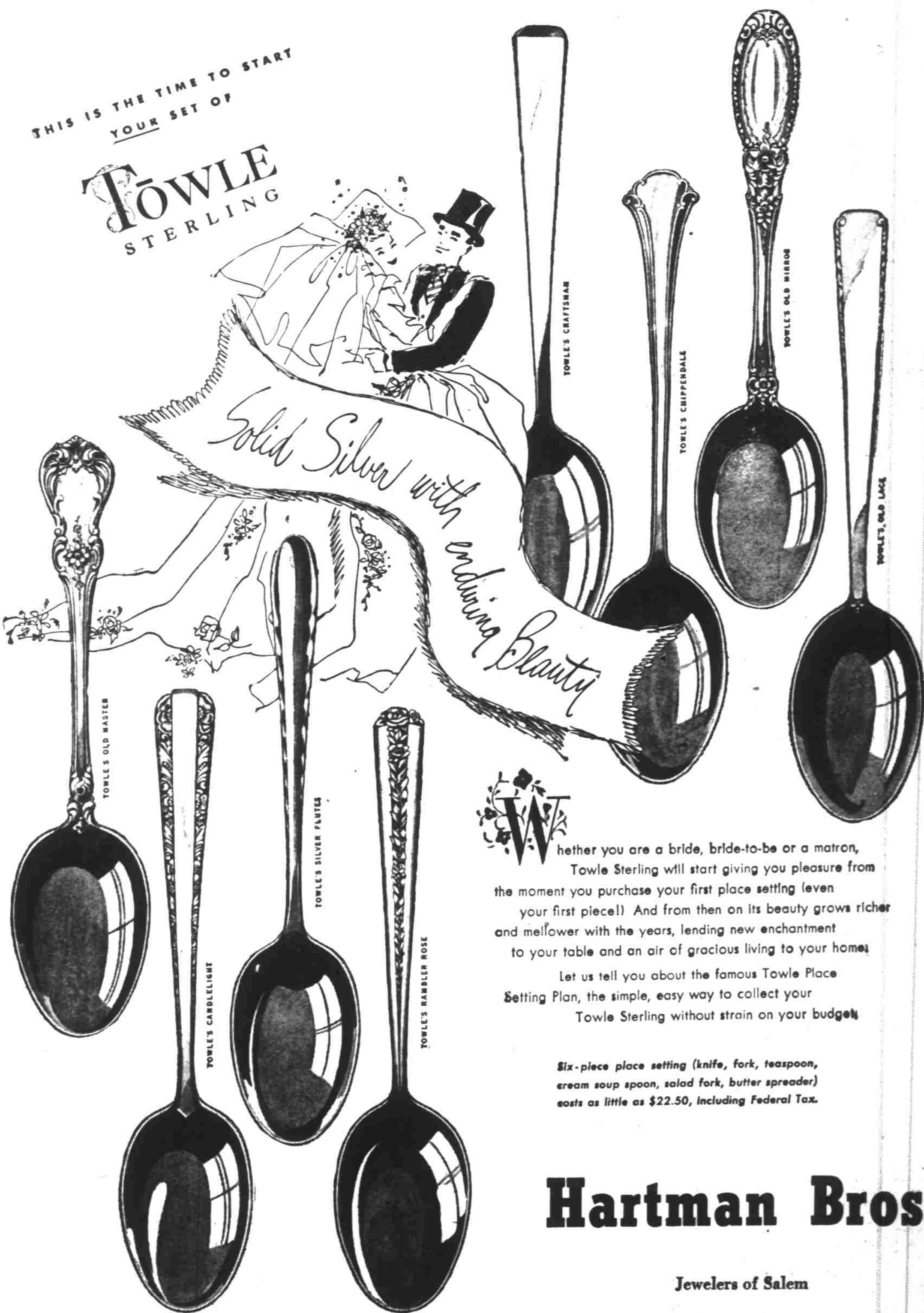
