

Young GOP Group to Visit Convention

Steve Anderson, Salem attorney and state president of the Young Republican club of Oregon, and seven local chapter members will attend the national republican convention in Philadelphia starting June 20, it was announced Wednesday.

Other Salem club members are Jim Hatfield, alternate for Carl Hogg, republican convention delegate; Norton Younglove, Miles Edwards, Orville Hager, Russell Trupp, Jim Ragland and Clarence Wicks.

Anderson, his wife and the delegates will leave Salem Friday for Boise, Idaho, where Anderson will be featured speaker at an Idaho state convention of Young Republican clubs on Saturday night. The men will leave Boise by train Sunday morning, but Mrs. Anderson will return to Salem.

Members of the group will make stopovers in various cities throughout the east, including Detroit, New York City and Washington, D. C., before going to Philadelphia.

Purpose of the trip, Anderson said, is to acquaint the young politicians with procedures of the national convention. Several men in the local representation backed Harold E. Stassen's campaign in Oregon and will be vitally interested in the Minnesota's fortunes at the convention. A total of 20 of Oregon's Young Republicans will be in Philadelphia when the republican presidential candidate is selected.

Attlee Cables Sympathy Note

Clement R. Attlee, prime minister of Great Britain, cabled to London to the Oregon executive department in Salem Wednesday, expressing sympathy for victims of the recent Oregon flood disaster.

His message read: "Deeply regret to learn of the distress and suffering caused by the disastrous flood in Portland and its neighborhood and would like to express my sincere sympathy and that of my colleagues with the unfortunate victims of this calamity."

The telegram was forwarded to Salem by Stanley Woodward, chief of protocol, department of state, Washington, D. C., from the White House.

Election Held At Shrine Meet

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 9 (AP)—Karl Rex Hammers of Pittsburgh, retiring imperial potentate, today was defeated in his election bid for the \$15,000-a-year post as recorder of the ancient Shrine order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

Shrine officials announced George M. Saunders of Kansas City, a member of Ararat Temple of which President Truman is a member, was elected recorder.

In the only other contest for Shrine office, Thomas W. Melham, Milwaukee insurance man, and past potentate of Tripoli Temple, won election to the post of imperial outer guard over five contestants. Melham was elected unanimously after two ballots.

Galloway Calhoun of Tyler, Tex., was installed as imperial potentate, succeeding Hammers. Harold Lloyd, bespectacled, one-time movie comedian, became deputy imperial potentate. Lloyd automatically becomes imperial potentate next year.

SP to Purchase 95 Locomotives

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—The Southern Pacific Co. announced today it had placed orders of approximately \$25,000,000 for 95 diesel electric freight locomotives of various types.

The company said the order was one of the largest railroad equipment purchases ever made.

President A. T. Mericer, who made the announcement, said bids were being received on 30 new diesel mainline freight locomotives of 6,000 horsepower each, and 65 diesel switch engines ranging in horsepower from 600 to 1,500.

Berry Growers to Meet Wednesday

SILVERTON HILLS, June 9 (Special)—Strawberry growers of this area will meet next Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Silverton Hills Community clubhouse to set this year's prices for strawberry picking.

Officers of the Silverton Hills Berry Growers association set the price meeting tonight after recent warm weather brought the strawberry harvest nearer. Picking prices last year ranged from 4 to 4½ cents a box with a ½-cent box bonus. No hint of this year's price was forthcoming Wednesday, growers stated.

Congressmen Ask Coordination of Disaster Relief

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—Coordination by the Federal Works administrator of emergency activities of federal agencies in disaster areas was proposed today by Reps. Angell and Norblad, Oregon republicans and Mack (R-Wash.).

Their bill is a companion to one introduced in the senate last night by Senator Cordon (R-Ore) and 27 other western senators.

The measures would permit the administrator to extend emergency aid including restoration of public utilities resulting from fire, flood, earthquakes or other disasters.

The administrator would be authorized to incur obligations for such relief up to \$10,000,000 at any single time.

ASK TO MEET TRUMAN
SAN FRANCISCO, June 9 (AP)—West coast maritime unions asked President Truman today for an audience on the threatened June 15 maritime strike. Harry Bridges said the president had been asked to meet with a delegation representing the five unions involved.

House Approves Appropriation Bill

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—The house passed and sent to the senate today a \$3,795,048,931 appropriation bill. It finances the atomic energy commission, the veterans' administration and several other agencies, and it abolishes the war assets administration.

The house followed generally the recommendations of its appropriations committee, which had ordered an aggregate cut of \$504,570,069 from the amounts President Truman had requested.

Santiam Junction Airport Fund Voted

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—The state board of aeronautics today allocated \$1,500 for clearing and grading the Santiam Junction runway and \$500 for construction of air markers.

The board also authorized a \$12,000 improvement of the Lake-side airport near Portland. The field, deeded to the state by the forestry department, will be made a class II airport. The board plans to buy a 3,500-foot land and construct a 3,500-foot runway 300 feet wide.

FIRE GUTS FOCHOW
SHANGHAI, Thursday, June 10 (AP)—Central News agency said today a fire Monday night wiped out buildings on 20 streets and alleys in the Fochow, South China, business district. It reported 1,239 houses were destroyed, among other buildings. Emergency relief stations were set up for the estimated 12,000 homeless.

U.S. May Give Russia Rest Of Reparations

LONDON, June 9 (AP)—Official British sources said today they expect the United States to agree soon to give Russia the rest of the reparations from western Germany due under the Potsdam agreement.

Russia has not been allocated any dismantled industrial plants from any of the three zones of western Germany since mid-1946.

Allotments were handled by a subsidiary of the allied control council in Berlin, and the United States vetoed every Russian effort to get more German plants.

The U. S. also stopped delivery of previously allocated equipment although Britain and France went on handing over plants which had been earmarked for Russia earlier.

Washington Secretary of State Marshall told a news conference today that negotiations with Britain and France on the issue of German reparations for Russia have been under way for some time. He said no agreement had been reached yet.

Deadline for Vet Amputees

Leg amputee World War II veterans who have not applied for automobiles at government expense may do so before this act expires June 30, the state department of veterans affairs announced Wednesday.

To be eligible for a car "or other conveyance," the veteran must have suffered an amputation at or above the ankle or have suffered the loss of use of one or both legs as the result of service in World War II.

Sweetland Asks Dewey, Stassen Reveal Expenses

NEWPORT, June 9 (AP)—A demand that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and Harold E. Stassen report the money they spent in their Oregon primary election campaign came today from a democratic official.

Monroe Sweetland, democratic national committeeman — elect, said he filed a formal complaint with the secretary of state, asking him to demand the expense reports.

"If they are not forthcoming," wrote Sweetland, "I request you to proceed under the criminal proceedings applicable to candidates who fail to file reports of money received and expended."

The law requires such expense reports in most cases. The elections chief in the secretary of state's office said, however, that the law apparently did not apply to presidential primaries.

Bad Case of Spy Jitters In Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, June 9 (AP)—As if besieged Jerusalem hadn't trouble enough — now it has a bad case of spy jitters.

Anyone on the street who cannot answer questions of guards in Hebrew promptly becomes "a spy for the Arabs" and usually is hustled off for questioning.

The situation got worse as the shelling went on. Now, in the 28th day, Arab artillery fire is beginning to get on the people's nerves.

Each one of 90,000 Jews thinks most of the rest probably are shell-fire spotters.

Yesterday Haganah security police ran up to an apartment house roof because a housewife was hanging out laundry. It could have been flag signals, they said.

Associated Press Photographer James Pringle was arrested and held for 45 minutes in the Jewish agency building last night because he answered in English, tinged with Irish brogue, when a guard asked him the time.

John Donovan of the National Broadcasting company has been arrested twice, just for appearing at the gate to the Haganah compound. He was held three hours the first time and an hour the second.
