Miscellany of summertime ideas: The emergency shelf for summer should be a bit different from the winter one. Sudden picnics can be prepared for by always having a supply of outdoor pickup foods available. Olives, relishes, canned meats that can be served cold, a favored French dressing (perhaps a ready made one) and some canned fruits that go well in salad should be included.

Chocolate sauce, the kind that comes in a can, will make a company dish out of homely vanilla ice cream. Cook, mashed dried apricot pulp or peach pulp, sweetened with an equal amount of cup for cup sugar and water syrup, gives unusual toppings for the sundaes.

When going in for new fangled picnic dinners, don't forget to include the old fashioned favorite, deviled eggs. You can give them a new look by adding chopped olives (get them ready-minced in a can) or by mincing up green peppers with the yolks for a filling.

Some of the prepared punch mixes satisfy young thirsts and prove less expensive than bottled or canned juices. Several of the powdered synthetic fruit flavors are creditable for even adult tastes. Check on the best kind your grocer carries, and lay in a supply. Incidentally, a base of tea instead of water, gives added flavor to beverages, and costs but little.
