

County School Officials Pass On Wage Scale

The Oregon County School Superintendents association in annual conference here Thursday approved proposed legislation providing that the salary of the school superintendent of any county for any year shall be not less than the average salary of the high school principals of that county for the previous year.

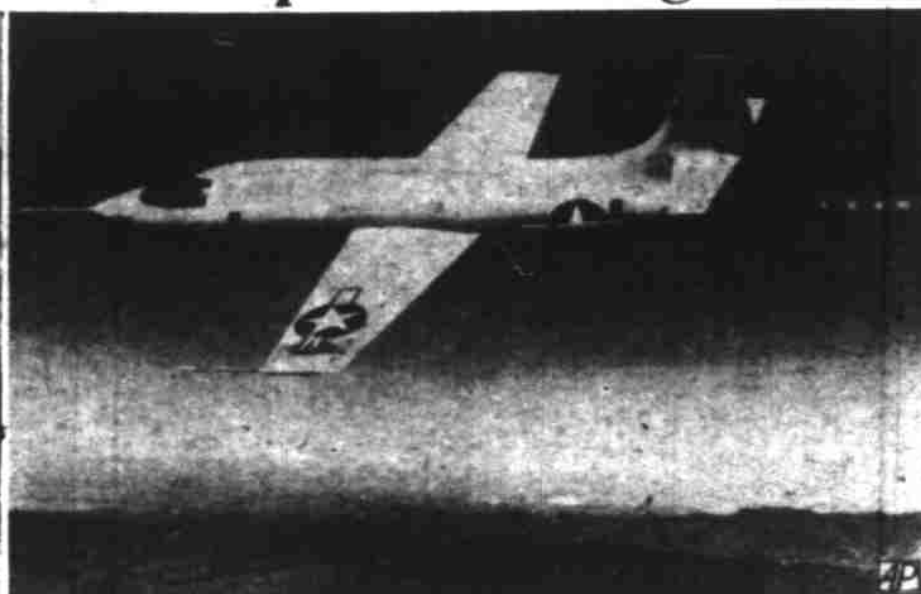
Another resolution urged state aid in the construction of school buildings and employment of a

permanent school building consultant. It also was proposed that the existing laws fixing the date on which a school board must give notice in writing to a teacher that he or she is being retained or dismissed be changed from March 15 to May 15 and that the date for the teacher to reply be changed from April 1 to June 1.

The conference voted down a resolution providing that the offices of county educational board and non-high school district board be abolished and their functions be taken over by the rural school district board.
