The bride-elect was graduated from Oregon State college in 1945 and Cornell university in 1945. She is now associated with the American Viscose corporation in New York City, where she is serving as head of consumer relations. Miss Schrupp is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Davidson of Grants Pass and the great granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Elijah J. Davidson. Mr. Davidson was a trustee of Monmouth Christian college, now Oregon College of Education. Another great grandfather was the late George W. Bailey, early pioneer of the state of Oregon.

Mr. Pickens attended the University of Oregon and graduated from Philadelphia Textile Institute. He was formerly associated with the American Viscose corporation in Philadelphia, and is now head of the fabric division of Oregon Worsteds company in Portland.
