

Jamaica Star Misses Record

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—Sprinter Herb McKenley missed his bid for a new world record at 400 meters today and flunked his first test as a track and field promoter in the bargain.

The former University of Illinois ace from Jamaica won the 400-meter dash at a benefit meet this evening, just as he is expected to do in the coming Olympic games.

But his advertised duel with Lloyd Labeach didn't come off because the Panama flash didn't show up. Neither did three-fourths of the anticipated 10,000 customers.

McKenley, who was the guiding force behind the charity venture, fell four-tenths of a second short of his announced assault on the world 400-meter record when he turned the distance in 46.4 seconds.

But it was the fastest 400 meters ever run in New York and a tenth if a second faster than the time which won for Archie Williams in the 1936 Olympics.

M. W. Webber, of Portland, caught this hybrid trout while trolling in Fish Lake, Jackson county. The fish measured 14 inches and was caught on a flatfish. The mottling, usually found on the back of the eastern brook trout, is shown on the back and sides of this fish, against a silver background. Along with eastern brook markings, the fish shows intermediate characteristics of the genus Salmo, which includes the rainbow, cutthroats and brown trout. The only known fish present in Fish Lake are eastern brook and the fall-spawning rainbow, both of which reproduce in the lake, using the same limited spawning area.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12 (AP)—A Milwaukie high school javelin ace set a new Oregon AAU record tonight in the open division of the State Field and Track tournament.

The 204, 8 inch heave by Chuck Missfeldt, the Milwaukie school entry, also bettered the 199 feet, 10 inch mark posted in today's competition by Lou Robinson, University of Oregon, who won the 1948 Pacific coast college conference championship.

British Gain Davis Semis

LONDON, June 12 (AP)—England has qualified for a berth in the semifinal round of the European zone Davis cup tennis play but the British opponent will not be known until Monday.

The Britons advanced today by sweeping both singles in their final quarterfinal round competition with Holland at Birmingham, England. It was the first time they have reached the round of four since 1939. The score was four matches to one.

Either Sweden or Hungary will oppose the British next. Their competition, being played between showers at Budapest, is deadlocked now at one match each.

In the lower bracket, Czechoslovakia leads Belgium, two matches to one, with the Czechs, 1947 European zone champions, a slight favorite. Italy, host to Denmark, leads the Danes by two matches to none.

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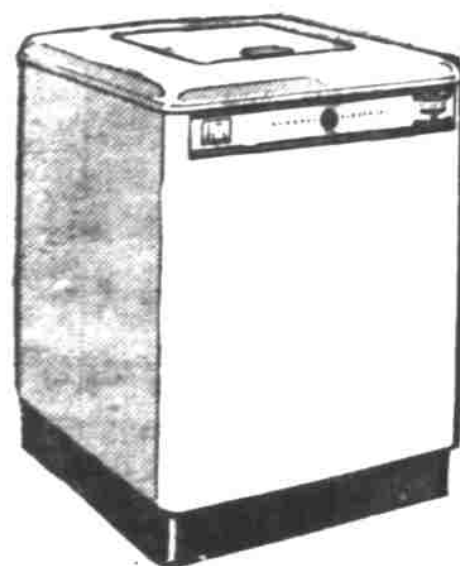
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
