Salem's Council of Church women will again care for migrant children at the Salem Agricultural housing camp during the summer season. Representatives of six churches Thursday went to the camp to look over equipment and facilities preparatory to opening their camp for migrant children next week. Mrs. T. S. Mackenzie is chairman of the migrant children committee for the council and Mrs. L. H. Randle is the group's president.

Teachers are to arrive in Salem next week to conduct the camp. Children from the ages of 2 1/2 years to 10 years are to be taken free at the camp, and crop workers who live out at the housing project are being urged to register their children for the duration of the season, bean and hop, said Mrs. Mackenzie Saturday. The Salem Council of Church Women, which finances the project each year, represents some 15 churches.
