

Operations at Busy Airport Go Smoothly

United Air Lines, only airline regularly in Salem and biggest emergency user of the field since Portland's was closed by flood danger, is operating 34 flights daily compared to its pre-flood four. Of these three are DC-6s, 14 and DC-4s and 17 are DC-3s. Operations are at about 90 per cent of plane capacity, according to Harold Sweeney, local UAL manager. About 400 passengers board the planes here daily, including a majority transported here from Portland by bus and limousine. United also has about 100 employees residing in Salem because of the increased traffic. Sufficient equipment was brought down from Portland to handle passenger and baggage loading smoothly, said Sweeney.

On the western side of the field, Northwest Air Lines is running eight flights daily and Western Airlines six. These include DC-3s and DC-4s, although Northwest has announced plans to use nearly all Martin 202s beginning July 1. It was declared Thursday that plenty of equipment was on hand, and that most of the 50 emergency employees are staying in Salem now.

L. J. Schuck, Portland manager for Northwest, who is directing both lines here, said the concrete aprons on the west side of the field have prevented troubles experienced by United, where taxiways and aprons have had ruts worn by heavy planes.

"We're getting mighty fine cooperation in Salem," Schuck declared.

Douglas Tops Demo Write-ins As Choice for Vice President

Official canvass of the state's vote for democratic candidates in the May primary election, released Thursday, showed Justice William O. Douglas of the U.S. supreme court as the voters' vice presidential choice on that ticket.

Douglas, who received 4,653 write-in votes, was followed, in partial official returns, by Sen. Glenn H. Taylor of Idaho, 624; Secretary of State George Marshall, 544; ex-governor Ellis Arnall of Georgia, 74, and Sen. Alben Barkley of Kentucky, 49.

Other official results released were: Monroe Sweetland, Newport, was elected democratic national committeeman with 43,004 votes. Mike M. DeCicco, Portland, received 40,425; W. E. Wilkins, LaGrande, 33,182; Henry C. Alken, Heppner, 31,228.

Nancy Honeyman Robinson, Portland, unopposed for re-election as democratic national committeewoman, received 114,976 votes—more than the 112,962 votes cast for President Truman.

State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland, topped the contest for delegates to the democratic national convention, state-at-large, with 99,458 votes. Henry Aiken, Heppner, had 81,382; George W. Friede, Portland, 80,910; Ashley Greene, Portland, 76,105; Edwin J. Welsh, Portland, 73,099; Byron G. Carney, Milwaukie, 72,940; Carl Anderson, Portland, 71,682; Charles T. McPherson, Portland, 70,187.

Detroit Worker Held on Charge of Automobile Theft

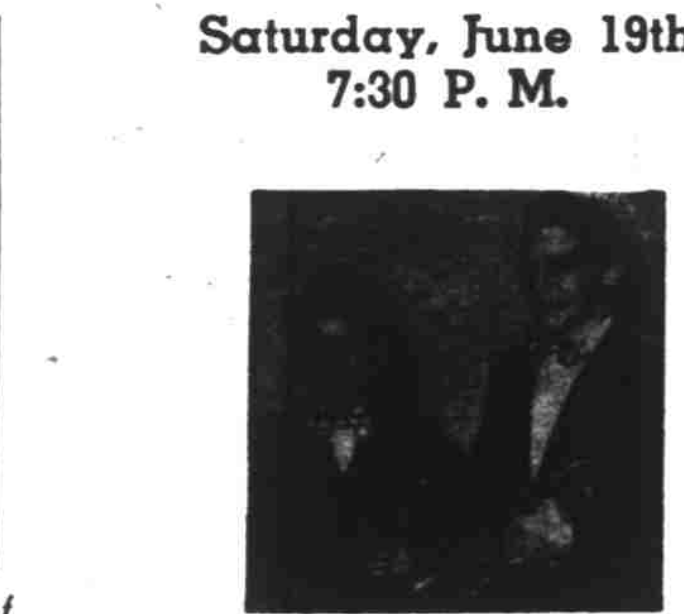
Junior Richard Bentz, 23, Detroit construction worker, was arrested at Detroit by state police early this morning on a charge of auto theft.

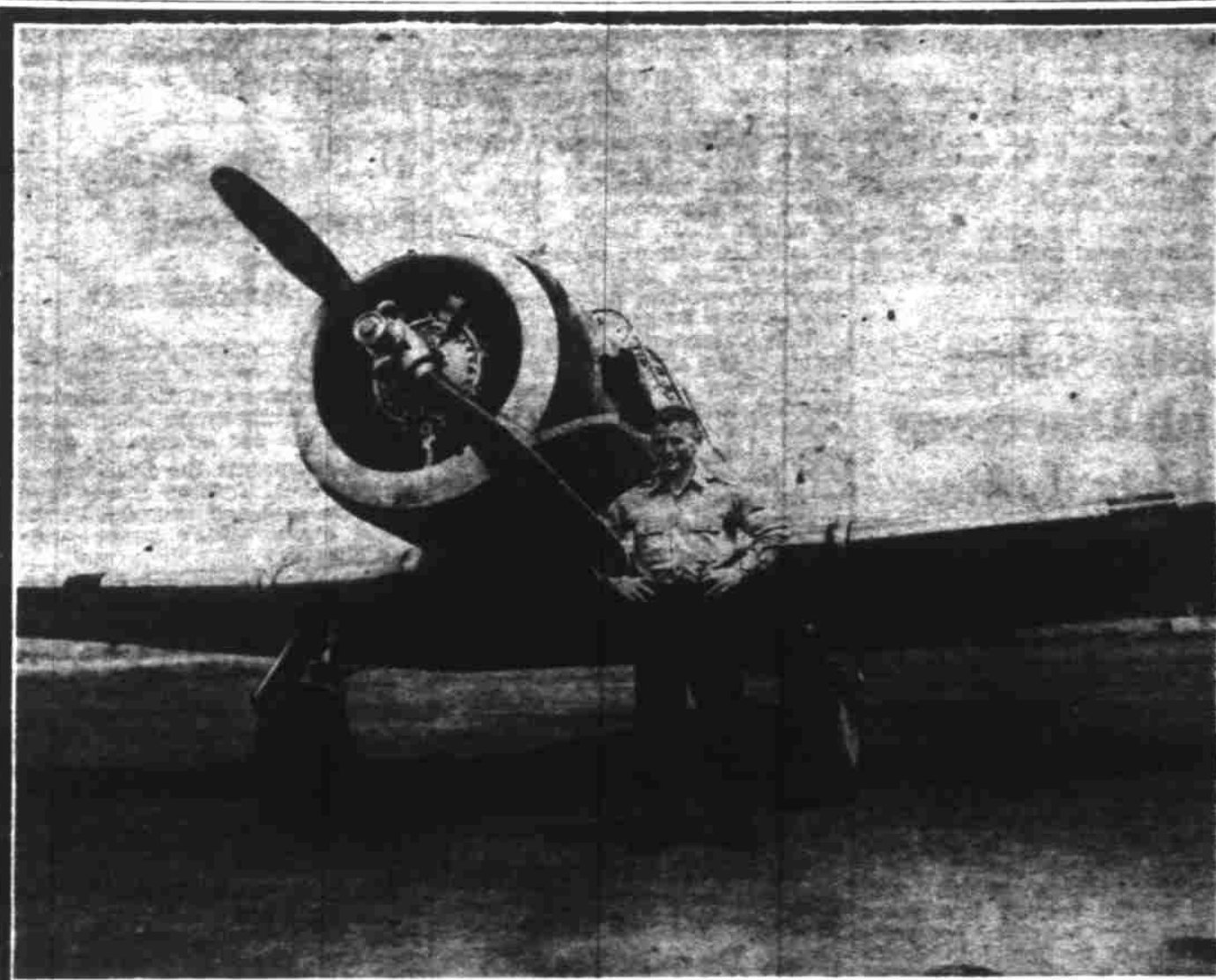
