On her return she will spend a week in Chicago with Miss Mollie Vlasnik, counselor for pre-school blind children in the Illinois department of public welfare, division for the blind.

Miss Swanson will be accompanied on her trip as far as Chicago by Miss Nancy Hoak, who is attending the summer session at the Sherwood School of Music. Both Miss Swanson and Miss Hoak are employed at the state school for the blind.

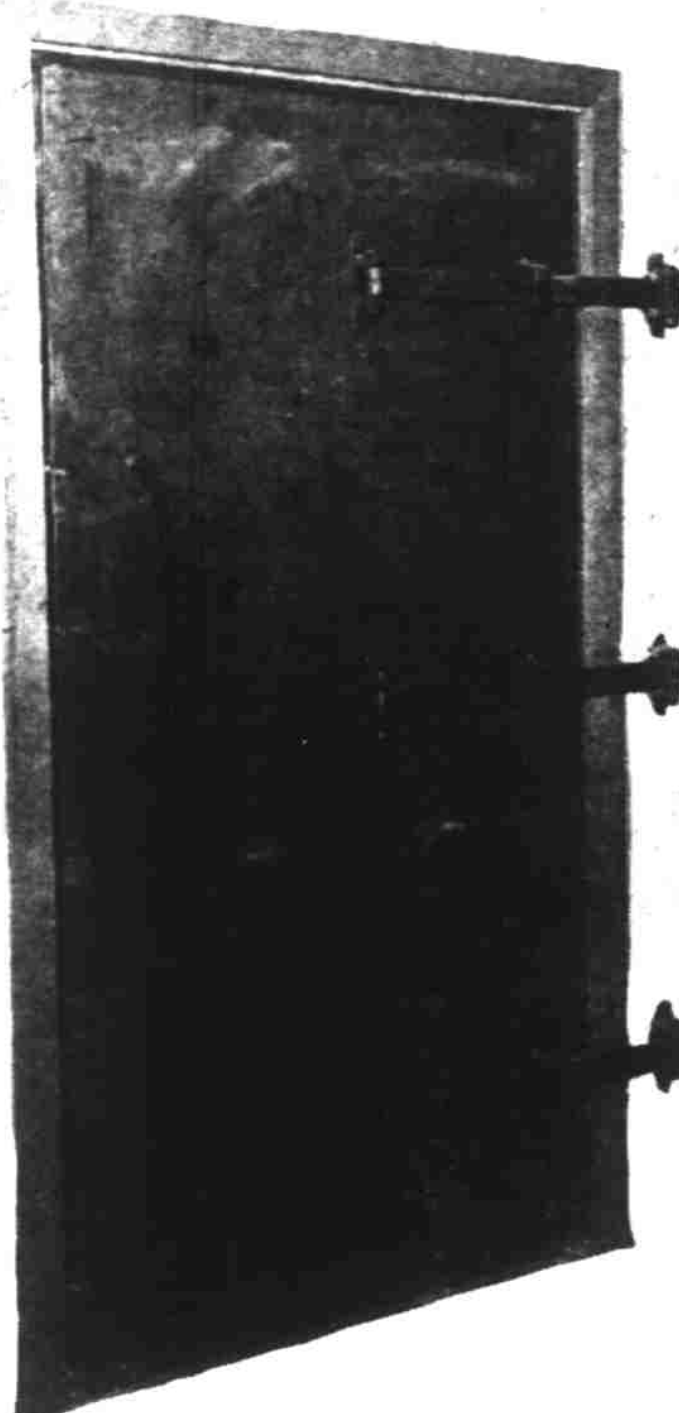
