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Locating a State Mental Hospital

The Medford Mail-Tribune attributes The Statesman's opposition to the use of Camp White as a state hospital to interest in expanding the Salem institution. The obvious retort is that the M-T's support is to obtain a new local "industry." We do not make it for we do not think it is true. The M-T sees the big plant, representing a large investment, standing idle. It has heard about congestion at the state hospitals so it puts one and one together and concludes the Camp White hospital should be taken over and used by the state.

The question is now academic because congress has directed the veterans' administration to use the facility. The objections to its use for a state hospital were summarized in a report made, not by Salem people but by a committee composed of legislators and state officials. They pointed out the hospital was not adapted for state hospital use, that it would require a large sum to convert it for such use. It suffers also from being poorly situated, in a barren area where trees and grass and flowers do not thrive.

The Statesman is entirely willing to have the state establish another institution for care of the mentally ill whenever it seems advisable. We know there are many delightful spots in the Medford area where such an institution would be pleasantly situated. But experience with the Pendleton institution points to the wisdom of locating the hospital closer to population centers. For this reason a location in Multnomah, Washington, Yamhill or Clackamas counties is to be preferred.

Suspending Plywood Tariff

It takes a lot of nerve for the plywood people to oppose the bill in congress to suspend the tariff on plywood for a year; but judging by the prices they charge, the plywood manufacturers have it. Have you tried to buy a panel of plywood lately? It surely takes off several layers of currency to effect a purchase, and what you get is probably usable on one side only.

Costs of manufacturing are high. One reason they are high is because the plywood mills are bidding fancy prices for peeler logs. They can do that because their profit margin is wide. Removing the tariff might take off some of the cream, but it is doubtful if it would have a very serious effect on domestic producers. With world demand what it is, foreign countries wouldn't have much to export to the U.S.A.

Faced with excessive costs as they are house-builders deserve the small break which the pending bill would give them.

Norblad Scores an Extravagance

Paul Hoffman, administrator for ECA, has assured Congressman Walter Norblad that specifications for materials to be shipped to Europe will be closely scrutinized to effect economies. This was in response to the disclosure of the young Oregon congressman that ECA was buying the highest quality—and the most expensive—for European relief. Among items mentioned by Norblad was one for a stainless steel treatment chair at \$315 while an enameled chair costs only \$63.60.

Probably the ECA underlings merely borrowed specification sheets from other government departments which always demand the very best—that was noticed in army and navy installations in wartime. But the less expensive ones are just as serviceable and are in common use over this country. The taxpayers want this ECA money to go just as far as possible in providing recovery in Europe and Norblad is deserving of much credit for exposing initial extravagance. But knowing the tendencies of bureaucrats we'd advise him to continue his probing lest Hoffman's orders be lost in the shuffle.

The senate and house have each passed a farm bill. It's the political farmers rather than the dirt farmers who are pressing farm legislation at this time. The latter are not so puny they want to be wet-nursed by government.

Editorial Comment

LAST ROLL CALL

Many of us can still remember when the Grand Army of the Republic made a stalwart figure in parades. It is hard for us to realize that nearly as many years have now passed since Lincoln made his speech at Gettysburg as the fourscore and seven that had then elapsed since the Declaration of Independence. But James A. Hard of Rochester, commander of the G.A.R., department of New York, could realize the pathetic truth when he called the 82nd annual encampment to order on Thursday. Not one man responded. That which Confederate weapons and valor could not accomplish, time had done.

The old battlefields are quiet these days. Of the thousands of young men who defended the Ridge at Gettysburg, and those who attacked it, a handful are left. The tread of marching men retreating into Maryland is heard no more, except in sensitive imaginations. Only the monuments, the lines where the Confederate artillery stood, the valley where Pickett's infantry massed, the regimental memorials of the Union side, tell the terrible story. Chancellorsville and the Wilderness drowse in the summer weather. A Union soldier, dying too soon to be a member of the G.A.R., lies in nameless rest a few feet from where Stonewall Jackson fell. The old Confederate trenches can still be traced in the woods by Fredericksburg; the dead, most of them forever unknown, sleep in the old war cemeteries, and awaken to no bugles and to no drums.

We do not know how much of all this Mr. Hard remembers, what battles he fought, who were his comrades. We cannot recall the decree of fate in any war which strikes one young man down and allows another to live on to a great age. But we salute Mr. Hard and those few surviving men who in honor fought with him and against him.—New York Times.

controversial lands and the association of county judges and commissioners of the land grant counties have pressed the claim for transfer of control of these lands from the federal forest service to the department of the interior. The bill passed by the senate this week would confirm that claim.

The O & C lands presently administered by the department of the interior amount to a little over 2,000,000 acres. The converted lands are 462,000 acres in addition. Most of these lands are in timber-growing regions, and under the sustained yield program will yield substantial income to the counties in perpetuity. Since under forest service administration, counties receive but 25 per cent of the proceeds of timber sales they will profit by the transfer of control to the interior department which under the 1937 law shares with the counties 50 per cent of the income.

Senator Cordon, long familiar with the problem since he represented the counties before he became senator, is no doubt chiefly responsible for favorable action in the senate. It will require fast work however on the part of Congressmen Angel, Norblad and Ellsworth whose districts contain these lands, to get favorable action in the house as the session writhes to its close.

All parties realize the necessity for a decision in this matter and the senate vote establishes a strong precedent in favor of the interior department and the counties.
