

Foto-Feature Local Radio 'Hams' Participate In 'Emergency' Practice Plan

Salem amateur radio operators, along with thousands of other American hams, are resting up this week after a 24-hour nation-wide practice "emergency" period last Saturday and Sunday during which the air waves from Maryland to Oregon were filled with the dit-da-dit of international code and "Hello CQ" of voice operation.

Here in Salem, 11 members of the Salem Amateur Radio club simulated emergency conditions over the week end on top of Bald mountain, about 30 miles southwest of Salem in the coast range. There, with the permission and active aid of the Oregon forestry department, they set up their portable transmitters and receivers and power plants in a forest lookout atop the 3500-foot peak.

Cause of this activity was the twelfth annual field day event of the American Radio Relay league in a nationwide test of disaster communication facilities.

The emergency period was from 4 p.m. local standard time, June 12 to 4 p.m. June 13. Hundreds of radio groups such as the Salem club set up temporary antennas and portable equipment during the test period, and worked feverishly to make as many contacts with other groups as they could.
