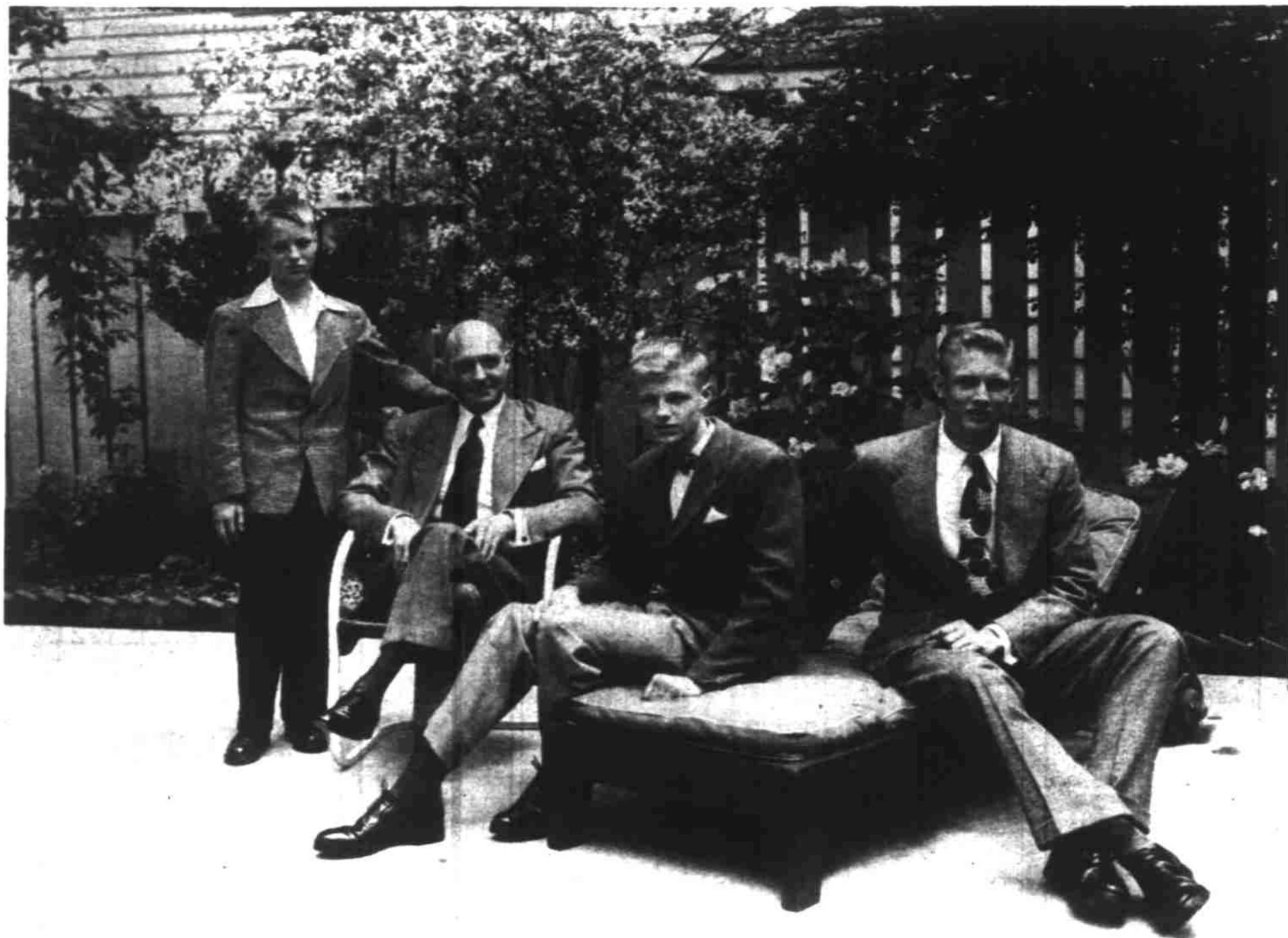

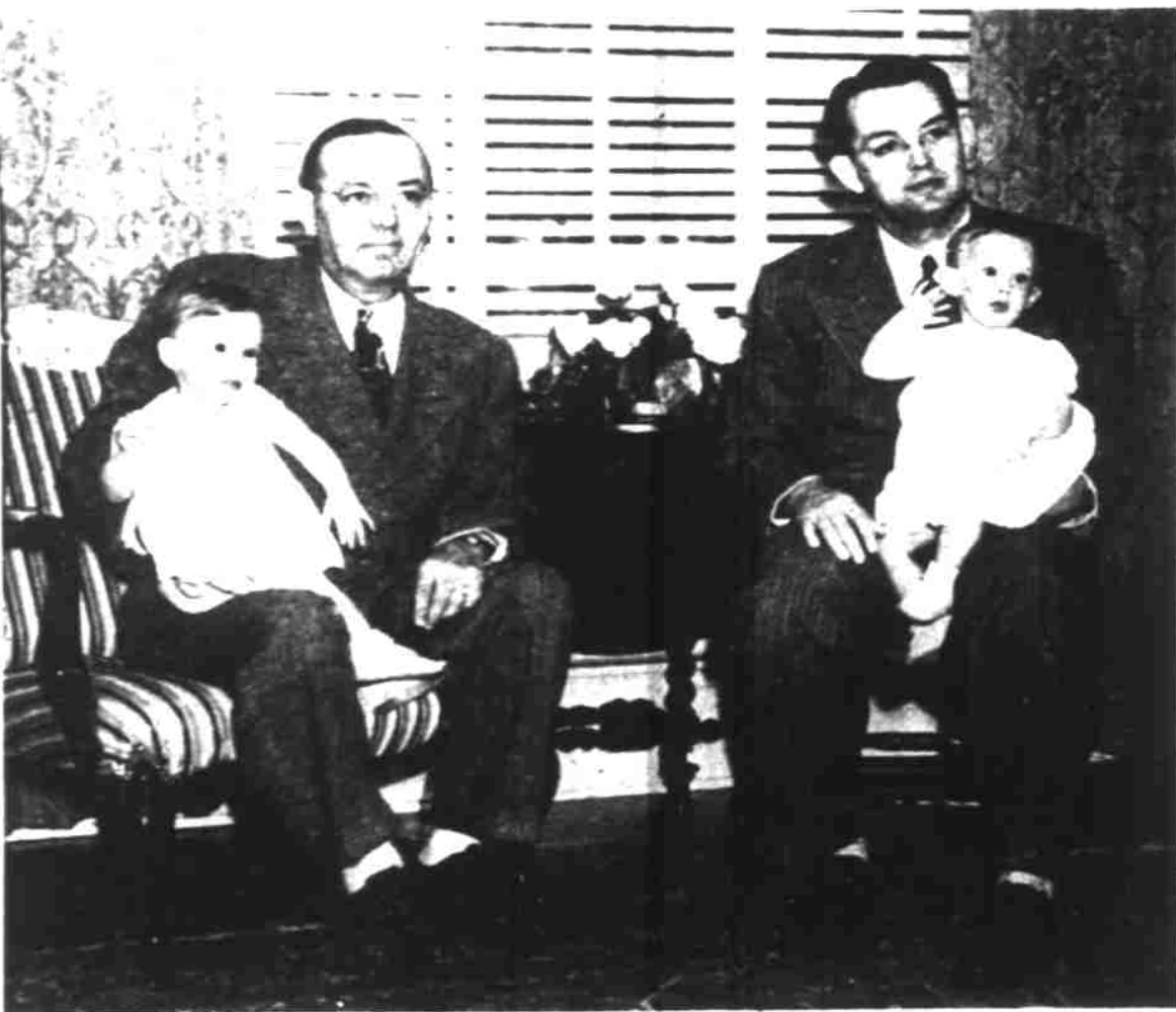
Parties for Brides-Elect . . .
