

Action on Budgets, Directors Taken at School Meetings in Many Parts of Central Valley

KEIZER, June 21—Keizer voters approved a special levy of \$45,000 by a vote of 19 to 2. Three votes were challenged and not counted. William Woelk was elected for the three year term as director to serve with Ralph Sipprell and Andrew Beardsley. The 1948-49 budget for Keizer district is \$119,955 as compared to \$117,672 for 1947-48. The meeting tonight was held to make the second \$1000 payment on the two-acre school building site. It was purchased for \$3,000 last year.

HAYESVILLE, June 21—Milton Dierks was elected school director to succeed Marc Saucy who is retiring after 12 years. Patrons of the district discussed a community hall to serve the Hayesville district and made plans to meet August 2 to discuss having the bus fare of \$36 per high school pupil included in the local district budget. This amount is paid by individual pupils attending Salem high school.

HUBBARD, June 21—Manton Carl was elected director for Hubbard school district tonight to make the place of William Bates. Harold Abbott received several written votes.

SALEM HEIGHTS, June 21—Hubbard Smith was re-elected director for the three year term and voters gave D. E. Desow as director for the three year term. The district 14 write-in vote for the zone 3 position on the non-high school board. No candidates were on the ballot.

NORTH HOWELL, June 21—Ronald Stevens was elected director for the three year term at the annual school meeting tonight. Conrad Gunerson was elected to replace Frank Hynes on the non-high school board for zone 1.

Because of consolidations during the last year North Howell is the only district in zone 1 so that approval by voters here amounts to election for the zone.

CENTRAL HOWELL, June 21—Walter Haberson was elected for the three year term as school director tonight. Residents discussed improvements which must be made to bring up standards of the school building. These improvements include new lights for which wiring will be necessary, new shades on the windows, and provision for hot water in the rest rooms.

DALLAS, June 21—Dallas voters tonight approved the 1948-49 school budget 108 to 21. Total to be raised by taxation is \$190,668, of which \$63,000 is outside the 6 per cent limitation. George H. Kurze was re-elected for a five-year term on the school board.

WOODBURN, June 21—Three school directors were elected from a field of six candidates tonight in a well-attended school meeting. Chosen were Dean Bishoprick, to succeed himself, Clair Nibler of the old Belle Passi district and Ray Stampley from the old Hall district.

Nibler led the field with 396 votes, Bishoprick, 391, and Stampley, 371. Clyde Smith had 212, Gordon Luffman 189, and D. L. Seeley 176.

Woodburn will vote again on a budget July 14, having voted one down last week.

INDEPENDENCE, June 21—Independence unanimously approved its 1948-49 budget totaling \$115,128.25 tonight, 31 to 0.

Bev Walker of the old Highland district, now part of Independence, was elected director for the three-year term. Incumbent Francis Newton was not a candidate.

Melford Nelson received 30 votes for the zone 1 position on the rural school board now held by O. G. Wells, who received one vote as did Dr. M. J. Butler.

SILVERTON, June 21—Norman Naegeli was elected director of the Silverton school district tonight with 21 votes, on the smallest annual school vote on record.

GERVAIS, June 21—Mrs. Henry Steger was elected school director for the three-year term and Sylvester Smith of St. Paul received all Gervais votes for the rural school board to succeed himself. Other members of the Gervais board are Harold Lenhardt and Bert Knowles.

BROOKS, June 21—Brooks school district elected two members of the school board tonight. Harry Bosch for the three year term and Oren Sturges for the two-year term. Sturges was appointed nearly a year ago when Sam Ramp resigned.

Salem Women Hurt in Blast Of Oil Stove

Two Salem women were seriously injured at Jackson, Wyo., Monday morning when an oil stove in the cabin where they were staying exploded and blew the building to pieces.

Mrs. Mary N. Wilson, 2500 S. Summer st., was taken to Holy Cross hospital in Salt Lake City, suffering burns, a broken arm and fractures of both legs. Her daughter, Helen Wilson, a Marion county welfare department case worker, was taken to a Jackson hospital with a broken leg and ankle. Another daughter, Lucille Wilson, a Newport school teacher, sustained minor injuries.

The Associated Press at Salt Lake City informed The Statesman last night that Mrs. Wilson's condition was "fairly good."

Word concerning the accident was received in Salem Monday afternoon by Arthur Wilson, son and brother of the injured women. Wilson said they were motoring to Minnesota at the time of the mishap.

Wilson left Salem Monday night by plane to be at the bedside of his mother in Salt Lake City.

Girls Hurt in Auto Accident

Two Salem girls were injured slightly Monday night in an auto collision 10 miles south of here on highway 99E, state police reported.

Treated at Salem Memorial hospital for cuts and dismissed were Laura T. and Linda Jo Baumann, both of Salem route 4. Police reported the girls were passengers in a car driven by their father, Arnold J. Baumann, which collided with another vehicle operated by Frank M. Hughes, Corvallis. Baumann and Hughes were unhurt, police said, but both cars were damaged extensively.

Olympic Track Trials Dated

CHICAGO, June 24—(Special)—The schedule for the final tryouts for the U. S. Olympic track and field team was announced today by K. L. (Tug) Wilson, chairman of the committee. The trials, to be held July 9 and 10 at Northwestern university's Dyche stadium in suburban Evanston, will include tests in 17 events. Twelve men will be qualified to compete in each event, six from the NCAA championships completed Saturday at Minneapolis and six from the national AAU championships to be held July 2-3 at Milwaukee, Wis.

The first three men placing in each event will be nominated for the U. S. Olympic team, Wilson said.

WASHINGTON, June 21—(AP)—United States and Western European Union officials are now working out final details of plans for military talks between the American government and the European organization.

The talks are to be held soon, probably in Washington, but possibly in London. They will constitute the opening of the next stage of American foreign policy toward Europe.

State Department Press Officer Michael McDermott, when asked today about an Associated Press disclosure that the meetings will be held, called the report "speculative." He said that the whole matter is under study, and that no decisions have been reached.

But from other sources, it was learned that top U. S. officials are certain the talks will take place.

Draft-agers Rush to Join National Guard

WASHINGTON, June 21—(AP)—National Guard headquarters said today it was receiving reports from all over the country showing a rush of draft age men to enlist. Under provisions of the draft bill passed Saturday by congress, men who join the guard before President Truman signs the bill are exempt from the draft.

A guard headquarters representative said it was not possible at this early date to give even an estimate on the number of in-closed enlistments, but that state guard headquarters are reporting "plenty of activity."

Official figures available June 30 or a few days afterward are expected to show a marked increase for this period. Guard headquarters here and local units are being flooded with requests for information as to how to join.

The national guard now has an enrollment of 250,000 and its goal for June 30, 1948, the end of this fiscal year, is 271,000. The goal for the next fiscal year, ending June 30, 1949, is 341,000.

Details Being Planned for Military Talks

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Reds Accept Bid to Discuss Berlin Money

BERLIN, Tuesday, June 22—(AP)—The Russians accepted early today a British proposal for four-power discussions of uniform currency reform in Berlin, the Soviet - licensed German news agency announced after Gen. Sir Brian Robertson, the British military governor, bluntly told the Russians they had no more rights

in Berlin than the western allies. He suggested to the Soviets that they join a four-power meeting to discuss the currency situation in Berlin which now faces the prospect of two kinds of currency — that introduced beginning Sunday by the allies in western Germany, and currency soon expected to be produced by the Russians.

WASHINGTON, June 21—(AP)—Soft coal operators told President Truman's fact-finding board today that a new contract with John L. Lewis could be hammered out in 48 hours "if there was a will to do it on both sides."

Blasts at Two Plants Kill 5

OAKLAND, Calif., June 21—(AP)—An explosion disintegrated a nitroglycerine building at the Hercules Powder company plant at nearby Pinole, killing two men. The concussion was felt 20 miles away. It was the second Hercules Powder company explosion of the day. Earlier, a blast wrecked three nitroglycerin buildings at the company's Kenville, N. J., factory, killing three men and injuring two others.
