Retail Clerks International association, district 5, and the Oregon State Building and Construction Trades council completed their annual convention Sunday prior to the beginning of the state federation of labor convention Monday.

The builders reelected all officers. These include Volney P. Martin, Portland, president, C. W. Cray, Medford, vice president, John O'Neill, Portland, secretary.

Twenty-nine delegates to the retail clerks met in the Labor temple and came up with a number of resolutions. Chief among these were moves calling for compulsory health examinations of all food handlers, voter registration of all locals' members and a resolution asking that members write their congressmen regarding strife and unrest caused by the Taft-Hartley law.

J. D. McDonald, president of the state federation of labor, and James T. Marr, executive secretary-treasurer, spoke to the clerk delegates urging a return to basic union principles.

In addition to competing for increased cash prizes Oregon homemakers will receive valuable merchandise items.

The enlarged departments will be under the supervision of Annie Hunt McKennon of Salem. The entire display area for cooking and textiles in the fair's main agricultural building has been enlarged and redecorated.

Spitzbart also reported that due to increased exhibitor interest, prize money in the Red Poll livestock division has been increased substantially.

Premiums and prize money for the 1948 fair will approximate that of last year about \$75,000.
