Red Veto Kills A-Control Plan

LAKE SUCCESS, June 22—(AP)—Russia's 28th veto killed today a security council majority decision approving the American plan for world atomic control.

Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister who has bitterly assailed the American proposal, cast the veto. The Soviet Union voted with him.

The United States, Argentina, Britain, China, Belgium, Syria, France, Canada and Colombia—nine in all—voted to approve the entire work of the United Nations atomic energy commission.

Balked by the Soviet veto, the council then decided to send the records of the atomic deadlock to the general assembly meeting in Paris for its action.

Truman Sends Envoy to Israel

WASHINGTON, June 22—(AP)—President Truman tonight announced the exchange of diplomatic missions between this government and the provisional government of Israel.

Mr. Truman appointed James Grover McDonald of New York to serve as special representative of the United States in heading the mission to the new Jewish government.

Eliahu Epstein has been designated by Israel as its special representative in the United States.

Tornado Sweeps South Nebraska

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb., June 22—(AP)—A tornado swept through southeast Nebraska into Iowa today, killing one person, injuring six and toppling six cars of a freight train off the track.

Four of the injured were in the caboose of the freight train. The dead man was Harry Badberg, 31, Talmage, Neb., farmer. He was jammed between a fence and a pump when the wind hit his farm home.

Tunnels Urged to Replace Bridges

PORTLAND, June 22—(AP)—Tunnels under the Willamette and Columbia rivers were proposed today to solve Portland traffic problems. The Progressive Business Men's club proposed a tunnel connecting the west side with the projected Sullivan's Gulch freeway through the east side of town.

The tunnel under the Columbia between Portland and Vancouver, Wash., was proposed as a replacement for the Interstate bridge.

Civil Strife in Israel Sets Off Munitions Ship

TEL AVIV, Israel, June 22—(AP)—Thousands of Tel Aviv residents fled from the waterfront late today when a munitions-laden LST beached by rebel Irgun Zvai Leumi fighters threatened to explode after being set afire by Israeli army shelling.

The sudden fire, resulting from regular army mortar shelling, threw the four-hour battle between Irgun and the army into strange confusion.

Persons watching the waterfront from distant hill-tops said there were 12 or 15 explosions. Still later, an Irgun truck with a loudspeaker toured the streets and an announced proclaimed sarcastically:

"Haganah has achieved a great victory in blowing up our ship." Before this phase of the battle began it was estimated that 40 persons were killed or wounded when the government flung troops into action against Irgun's attempt to land arms. Under the U.N. four-week truce terms with the Arabs, importation of arms is barred.

Irgun had warned of a "blood battle between Jews." Israel leaders regarded the strife as possibly the long-expected showdown between Irgun and the regular army, composed chiefly of Haganah, the former Jewish underground defense force.

Airlines Spend \$2,000 per Day On Shuttle Service

Airline representatives, meeting in Portland Tuesday, said shuttling of cargo from Salem, forced when the Columbia airport was flooded, was costing \$2,000 a day.

Use of the Troutdale, Ore., airport as an alternate to the Salem municipal airport during the flood emergency was also discussed. No decision was reached with the CAA regarding transferring of some airline operations to a large private field east of Portland.

During the session, aviation industry spokesmen urged expansion of the Portland-Columbia airport while debating what can be done to expedite air traffic while the Portland field is flooded.

Greeks Attacked From Albania

ATHENS, Wednesday, June 23—(AP)—Press dispatches from the Second army corps at Kozane said today Greek army units moving from Konitsa had been attacked from Albania with heavy artillery and mortars.

The correspondent of the newspaper Embros reported that guerrillas withdrew into Albania west of Pyrososani. He said these guerrillas later reentered Greece near Amaranos and attacked a flank of the Greek troops.

Cominform Chiefs Said Meeting in Eastern Europe

WASHINGTON, June 22—(AP)—Reports of a mystery meeting of the Cominform somewhere in eastern Europe are taken here to mean that the Communist high command is getting ready its second round fight on the Marshall plan.

At the same time, state department officials are speculating that the commission must be coming to grips with the problems of tightening the hold of the Communists over the countries of eastern Europe. The tip-off on this line of activity came about two weeks ago when the Cominform Journal published in Belgrade called on the eastern European leaders to consolidate their administration.

Ninth Body Found In Vanport Area

PORTLAND, June 22—(AP)—Recovery of a woman's body today from waters over the flooded smashed city of Vanport raised the known death toll in the month-old Columbia river disaster area to 47 persons.

Nine bodies have been recovered from the war-built housing area. The woman found today was Mrs. Izumi Oyama, 47, wife of the publisher of the English language Japanese newspaper "Oregon Nippo."

The Red Cross lists 38,491 still homeless in the four Pacific northwest states.

Flood-Stricken Dairies Plead for Disaster Loans

PORTLAND, June 22—(AP)—Oregon dairymen today asked the department of agriculture to speed flood disaster loans in order to prevent bankruptcy among producers and serious loss of milk supply to the Portland area.

Henry Stippier, chairman of the department's Oregon council, said milk producers need cash grants to purchase feed for herds evacuated from Columbia river pasture lands now under water.

He said the dairymen will be forced to slaughter their animals rather than go further into debt unless the \$6,000,000 fund provided by congress is made available quickly. He said such action would bring a serious milk shortage to the Portland area this winter.

Joe Wilson Named Senator Nominee By 6-Vote Margin

Joe Wilson, Newport, defeated Theodore Stansbie, Toledo hotel owner, by four votes for the republican nomination for state senator, Lincoln and Tillamook counties, at the recent primary election, according to the official count released by the secretary of state Tuesday.

Wilson, for several terms state representative from Lincoln county, received 2,704 votes and Stansbie 2,700 votes.

DETROIT, June 22—(AP)—The CIO United Auto Workers turned thumbs down today on a Ford Motor Co. offer of 11 to 14 cents an hour wage boost.

The union promised a counter proposal of its own later this week. Up to now, it has demanded 30 cents an hour.

Four Corners Approves Levy

FOUR CORNERS, June 22—(Special)—Authorization of a two-mill levy for preliminary expenses of drainage surveys in the new Four Corners drainage district was approved by all 25 votes polled here Tuesday.

The election covered the original district of about 165 acres. Petitions are now in circulation to authorize the board to start the project, according to F. A. Boyington of the board.

The work would proceed with a view to serving the entire area, including about 150 acres south and east of the present district which has petitioned for annexation. Hearing on the petition is set for July 3.
