

Ivan Dobyns Dies Following Long Illness

Ivan McKinley Dobyns, 47, late resident of 105 Duncan ave., died Tuesday at a Portland hospital after a year's illness. He was a partner in the firm of Dobyns and Webb, local logging road construction contractors.

Dobyns was born Oct. 1, 1900, and had lived in Worland, Wyo., until 1940 when he and his family moved to Oregon. In 1941 they established their home in Salem and he and his partner started their business here in 1944. He was married to Margaret Johnson April 18, 1928, in Worland.

He was a member of Pacific lodge 50, AF & AM, and a member of the Scottish rite and Shriner's. He was a member of Jason Lee Methodist church.

Survivors are the widow, Margaret, and a son, Jere, both of Salem; his mother, Mrs. Emma Dobyns, Stigler, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. Bula Speer of Monroe, La.; Mrs. Irene McKinney of Little Rock, Ark.; and four brothers, Glen R. Dobyns, Refugio, Tex.; Lee R. Dobyns, Zephyr, Tex.; and Henry C. and Frank L. Dobyns, both of Stigler, Okla.

Funeral services are to be held Thursday, June 24, at 2 p.m. at the Clough-Barrick chapel, with the Rev. L. C. Kirby officiating. Ritualistic services will be by Pacific lodge 50, AF & AM, with interment in Belcrest Memorial park.

Units Train at Camp Adair

CAMP ADAIR, Ore., June 23 (Special)—The anti-tank and cannon companies of the 162nd and 186th infantry regiments of the 41st infantry division are at Camp Adair for five days of training on medium tanks.

Twelve officers and 115 men were in the convoy from Camp Clatsop that set up camp at Adair in preparation for training through Friday. Four medium tanks are available for instruction. A team of five regular army instructors from Ft. Lewis is to be in charge of the instruction.

Troops making the movement include: anti-tank company, 162nd regiment, Dallas, commanded by Capt. Richard W. Harmon; and anti-tank company, 186th regiment, Woodburn, commanded by Capt. Robert E. Renn, Lt. Col. A.

L. Lowe, Corvallis reserve officer, on duty with the Oregon national guard, is in charge of the five-day course.

Guardsmen will receive two hours of tank driving in addition to learning maintenance, nomenclature and mechanical training.

The tank training area is open to visitors during the five-day period, Colonel Lowe said.

Flood Waters Kill Thousands of Moles

Flood waters covering Columbia valley farmlands probably will accomplish one good task, county agents in that area report. Few if any of the hundreds of moles which pestered farmers in the bottom lands in recent years will survive the thorough dunking they are now getting.

Moles, the county agents say, have caused thousands of dollars in damage in that farming area during recent years.

Bartlett Cites Need for Salem Airport Growth

A plea for Salem to build an airport to handle transportation in the immediate and distant future, one to take its place with Portland in case of emergencies as is being handled now by the Salem field, was voiced by W. M. (Jack) Bartlett, Oregon director of aeronautics, speaking at Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon in the Marion hotel.

Transportation by air as it affects marketing of perishable crops, fruits, berries, poultry and flowers was stressed by the speaker, who cited instances of the advance of air transportation which had come to his attention.

Adequate air terminal facilities are simple as compared to a highway system, Bartlett pointed out, citing the short strip of runway surface needed for planes.

Several Sprays Must Be Used for Control

Considerable gray moldy appearance of apple leaves has been noticed recently in orchards which can be controlled by use of wettable or dusting sulphur. Wettable sulphur is put on at the rate of 6 pounds per 100 gallons of water. The dust is put on so that the tree gets good coverage.

Cherry growers are reminded that in order to control the cherry fruit fly, it is necessary to repeat applications of arsenic of lead or rotonone until the cherries are harvested. The arsenic of lead will last for 10 to 14 days while the rotonone to insure good protection must be applied about every 8 days.

R. B. Sears, Salem, president of the Oregon Polled Hereford Breeders, is encouraging a good showing of Polled cattle at the 1948 state fair and the Pacific International this year. A meeting of the breeders will be held September 6, following Hereford judging at the fair.

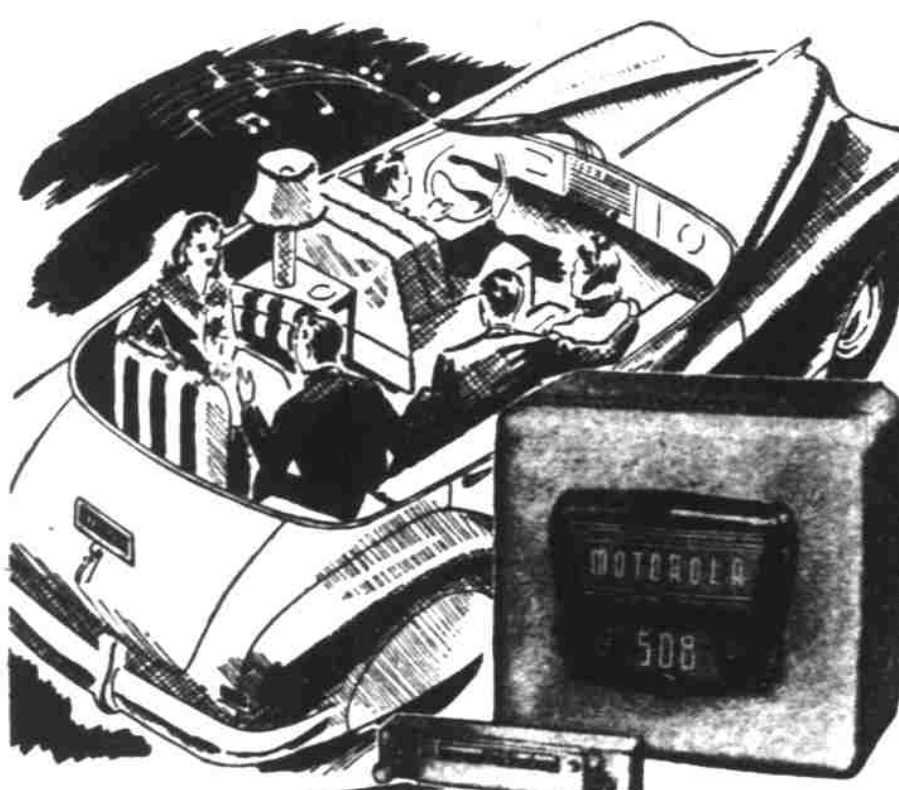
