

Rural School Boards Talk Over New Law

Rural school board members from many parts of Oregon gathered here Saturday when they discussed many problems involving the new rural school law.

The meeting was called by Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction.

Considerable discussion centered on what constitutes capital outlay and when it shall be allowed or disallowed in budgets.

Among other important topics discussed were revision of the basic school support formula, elimination of duplicated school bus routes, legislative changes to correct problems created when school districts reach the status of first class and what steps can be taken to improve budgeting practices in individual school districts.

The conference was conducted as an open forum with action on most of the problems being deferred until a future meeting.

Courthouse Courtroom Needs Planned

Definite recommendations for law court plans in the proposed new Marion county courthouse were made Saturday morning at the first meeting of a committee of members of the Marion County Bar association.

The committee, designated by the courthouse commission for making recommendations on the courthouse architecture outlined the need for court courtrooms to be used by the circuit court. Three are planned to be 25x40 feet in dimensions and the fourth to be 40x60 feet, with seating for 200 spectators.

Also planned is a 40x40 foot room to house the county law library. Judges and lawyers are planned to have access to the courtrooms as well as private entrances. Consultation rooms, lawyers' lobby, witness assembly rooms, jury rooms and dormitory, and two district court rooms and jury facilities are planned.

Private corridors would connect jury rooms and courtrooms, and all would have adequate lavatory facilities, as would rooms for court reporters and stenographers.

Making the recommendations on the bar association committee are Circuit Judge E. M. Page and George R. Dunean, District Judge Joseph B. Felton, and Attorneys Walter B. Winslow and George A. Rhoten, Harlan Judd, Marion county clerk and secretary of the courthouse. Building plans are set out in the conference taking notes with which to make up the committee report.

Final County Budget Meet Set Wednesday

No changes in the Marion county budget levy for 1948-49 are foreseen in the final open meeting Wednesday of the county budget committee, according to Marion County Judge Grant Murphy Saturday.

Marion county's levy will fall in line with the 6 per cent levy increase limitation, as finally approved by a six-man county budget committee a month ago. This will be under the \$968,328 ceiling.

The entire outlay for county purposes including the \$200,000 special courthouse levy for the year and revenues other than tax levies will exceed \$2,500,000. Judge Murphy said that deletions may be made upon consideration of any proposed cuts but that any additions could not be made unless some other portion of the budget were to be deleted.

However, he added, he expects no changes.
