

### GOP Top Duo Confer Today On Campaign

PAWLING, N. Y., June 28 (AP)—The governors of New York and California will sit down tomorrow in the quiet of Thomas E. Dewey's farm for their first heart-to-heart talk since they became the 1948 republican nominees. The chat will give Dewey and Gov. Earl Warren a chance to spell out details of the hard-hitting campaign they both have said they want.

Warren, his wife and three daughters are to arrive at 10:30 a.m. (EST) tomorrow to spend the day and possibly tomorrow night with the Dewey family. They will drive up from New York City. The presidential nominees' aides make no secret of the fact they are counting on Warren to bring many additional favor votes and specifically to carrying California for the GOP national ticket for the first time since 1928. Warren never has been beaten in a bid for public office.

Several swings across the country by the two men are in prospect.

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—Politics ran a dismal second to the kids during Gov. Earl Warren's first day in New York City.

The California governor, republican nominee and vice-president, capitulated to his three lively blonde daughters for a brisk round of night life tonight—proving himself no different than any other inductee father of girls.

Parental foot was put down on by the choice of shows. He ruled out any which he considered too sophisticated, and settled on a musical, "Finian's Rainbow," for the initial Broadway venture.

The girls—Virginia, 19, Dorothy, 17, and Nina Elizabeth (Honeybear), 14—at once became the darlings of the New York reporters. An arrangement finally had to be worked out by the governor whereby no attempt would be made to accompany them on an afternoon shopping tour with Mrs. Warren.

After the show tonight the Warren family went to the supper club of James H. McCabe, manager of the Hotel Pennsylvania where the Warren party is staying. McCabe is a former California.

Tomorrow morning the Warrens are to go to the Pawling N. Y. farm of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

Warren already has voiced a willingness to jump into the campaign early. His popularity in the west made him a natural to carry the brunt of the republican campaign for western support, particularly that from his native state.

Golden Gate Bridge Has Its 100th Suicide

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28 (AP)—The Golden Gate bridge, San Francisco's favorite pumping-off place, attracted its 100th suicide today.

A man identified as Fortunato Ornelas Anguiano ran the score to an even 100 when he made the 210-foot leap into the bay. Shortly before he went over the rail Anguiano asked two boys for a cigarette and told them he was from Mexico City.

In the 11 years since the bridge was built, only two persons have made the jump and lived. One was a man from Los Angeles, who did it as a publicity stunt. He was injured seriously and a dentist man tried at this year and died.

The other jumper who lived was a woman who jumped in 1941, breaking her back and various other bones.

### Check Reveals No Trace of Strange Plane

State police and the control tower at McNary field Tuesday morning have received no further information on a plane reported to have been heard on Salem police and state police radio frequencies early Monday morning sending emergency signals.

The plane was reportedly in the vicinity of Bald mountain, the coast range near Valsec. Attempts were made to locate it by the federal communications monitor.

The last signal heard by state police car 201 was at 4:10 a.m. when the officer heard the words "NC2756—emergency—need help."

Two More in Contest for 'Miss Salem'

The search for "Miss Salem" brought two more candidates into the race Monday, the sponsoring American Legion announced. Latest named are Miriam Shellenberger, employee of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, and Patricia Larson, employee of the Salem branch of the First National bank.

Miss Shellenberger is a 1946 graduate of Salem high school, 19 years of age, five feet 5 1/2 inches tall and weighs 126 pounds. She lives at 157 S. Winter st.

Miss Larson, also 19, is five feet 7 1/2 inches tall, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Larson of Salem. She has blue eyes and light brown hair.

Hope Seen in Letter from Eisenhower

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—A new letter from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower dealing with the subject of a possible political career was read tonight at an "Eisenhower" for "President" rally.

The general's letter made no direct reference to organized political efforts in his behalf.

The letter said: "When I made a public statement last January referring to a possible political career, I did it only after earnest study to determine the field in which I might possibly be of some future usefulness."

"I am anxious to do my duty but felt that it was my own problem to determine whether or not a sense of duty could call me into the political field."

The letter was read by Elliott Roosevelt at a meeting sponsored by Americans for Democratic Action.

In his formal speech which followed, Roosevelt said the general could not refuse "a true draft movement" at the democratic national convention.

Oregon's Flying Businessmen Plan Flight to Alaska

PORTLAND, Ore., June 28 (AP)—Oregon's flying businessmen are planning a 7,000-mile round trip to the arctic circle to better their own flight distance set on a trip to Mexico.

A squadron of about 25 planes is scheduled to take off here July 31. The planes will stop at Spokane, Wash., Great Falls, Mont., and then over the Canadian border to Lethbridge and Edmonton.

Then the group will wing over the Alaskan highway to Fairbanks. They move across the arctic circle at the end of their northward travels at Fort Yukon.

### Action Delayed On Franchise For Railroad

(Story also on page 1) Salem city council deferred for the second time Monday night action on a proposed ordinance to renew Oregon Electric's railroad franchise for 10 years.

Councilmen intimated they would pass the bill if the railroad offers some assurance of improving track crossings on Front and other streets. City Engineer J. H. Davis reported that although OE had been cooperative in the past, it had not responded to recent requests for crossing repairs.

Also deferred was action on pending bills to increase city regulation over peddlers, solicitors and canvassers. Council members said they wished to further study the bills and, meanwhile, also withhold action on requests for licenses by two house-to-house businesses seeking to operate here—a baby photographing firm of Portland, Avalon studio, and a representative of the World Book series.

The council passed two bills, one to void local option construction permits if the construction is not started within six months, and the other to give the name of King street to an east-west road between Argyle drive and Liberty road.

The council also authorized stop signs on 4th street at Hood street, changed this year's street light improvement plan from downtown Liberty to downtown Commercial street, gave Salem Memorial hospital permission to lay two-foot sidewalks at curbs along Oak and South Winter streets, authorized city water for site of the new navy reserve armory outside the city, and received from Rich L. Reimann a petition for the annexation of 400 acres southeast of Salem.

Three Valley Schools Name New Directors

STAYTON, June 28—Union high school district 4, Stayton, tonight elected five directors—who have constituted a temporary board—and adopted its budget for 1948-49 which provides for a tax levy of \$23.915.

Ward Inglis led the voting among the eight candidates for the five positions on the board. He received 70 votes. Others were Douglas Heater, Fern Ridge, 59; J. Peter Mertz, Cole, 59; Arthur Sander, Kingston, 53; Walter Hinrichs, Queener, 45. Other candidates were James R. Lande, Lyons, 15; Vernon Wilson, Mehama, 40; and Russell James, Jordan, 26. Edward J. Bell of Stayton is clerk.

TURNER ELECTS TWO

TURNER, June 28—F. B. Metcalfe of Crawford, was reelected today for a five-year term as director of union high school district 5, Turner. Guy Shields of Aumsville was elected for the two-year term, the position from which Fred Bates of Aumsville resigned.

Others who received votes were Sam Drager of Cloverdale and Howard Gilbert of West Stayton. Mrs. Wallace Riches of Turner is clerk.

DAYTON, June 28—Ersel Gubser, route 1, Dayton, was elected for the five-year term on the Dayton Union high school board here today. Other members of the board are John Shebrune, Mrs. Harry Sherman, George Webster and Charles Carr, all of Dayton. Annabell Nelson is clerk of the district.

NORTH BEND, Ore., June 28—Deborah Conklin, an 11-year-old modern miss, commutes daily to school 120 miles away.

She does it by commercial airliner—as resignedly bored as other youngsters riding a school bus. She attends a special University of Oregon class at Eugene. It costs \$6 daily—\$5 for the plane fare, \$1 for taxicabs.

Her father, Robert Conklin, manager of a timber company mill here, figures it costs less than her board would be in Eugene.

She never misses a meal at home. She leaves at 9 a.m. and is back by 1 p.m.

Portland Livestock Market Reopens; Prices Up Sharply

PORTLAND, June 28 (AP)—The Portland livestock market, closed four weeks by the flood, reopened today with prices up sharply.

Steers were an all-time high of \$33 a 100 pounds, up \$2 from the pre-flood level. Hogs were up to \$31.50, only 25 cents under the record high had \$6.25 above the pre-flood price.

Sheep were holding at May levels, although the \$26 paid for good and choice spring lambs was near the record price.

### Hundreds Use Outdoor Pool At Woodburn

WOODBURN, June 28—More than 1500 persons have used the Woodburn Memorial swimming pool in Settlemier park since it was "officially" opened Saturday through the kindness of Leland Plank, local contractor.

The opening Saturday was a formality, since the city has not taken over the pool from the contractor nor is it expected to do so until Thursday or Friday after Lyle Bartholomew, architect, has made his inspection and approves its acceptance by the city of Woodburn, which will then turn it over to the park board.

Representatives of the state health board made their inspection today.

Plank arranged to keep the pool open on his own responsibility because of public demand after the "official opening" Saturday. Helping him are Floyd Maricle and Harold Fleck, who like Plank himself have experience in such work.

When the pool is officially open, Carl Jorgenson of Gervais will be the life guard on duty, representing the city park board.
